Mrs. Rudy, as guest cook in today's Favorite Recipe column, has chosen three of her choice recipes to share with readers.

Chiliquila

- 1 doz. corn tortillas
- 1/2 lb. jack cheese (shredded)
- 4 green onions (chopped fine)
- 1 lb. ground round (sauteed)
- 1 No. 2 can La Victoria Enchilada sauce
- 1 8 oz. can tomato sauce
- 1 doz. green pimiento olives

Starting with tortillas cut in small pieces, place in shallow baking dish or casserole layers of Tortillas, shredded cheese, green onions, chopped fine, sauteed ground round. Combine sauces, pour over layered ingredients, top with sliced olives and shredded cheese. Bake 45 minutes at 325 degrees. Serves 6.

Bermuda Salad Bowl

- 1 small head cauliflower
- 1/2 large bermuda onion
- 1/2 cup sliced stuffed olives
- 2/3 cup French dressing
- 1/2 cup crumbled roquefort cheese
- 1 head lettuce

Separate cauliflower in flowerettes; slice thinly crosswise. Slice onion and separate in rings. Marinate cauliflower, onion, and olives in French dressing for 30 minutes. Just before serving, add cheese and lettuce in bite-sized pieces; toss lightly. Serves 6.

Apple Slice Cake

- 1 cup sugar
- 1 egg
- Mix and beat well.
- 3 tablespoons butter

Add:
1 cup sweet milk
2 1/4 cups flour
3 tsp. baking powder
1 apple, sliced very fine

Method: Put dough in pan, stick apples in the raw dough, cover the slices with a mixture of:
1 cup butter
1 cup brown sugar
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
Bake very slowly as the apples and dough must boil and mix together while baking. Approximately 1 hour at 325 degrees.
