Three Army men from Torrance are participating in the 3rd Armored Division's month-long winter training exercises in Grafenwohr, Germany, which will end Feb. 7.

High point of the Spearhead division's annual training cycle, the training includes day and night tactical exercises emphasizing cold weather training, mobility and chemical, biological and radiological warfare. An essential part of the training is range firing of individual and team-served weapons including the Army's new M-60 machinegun and the 105 and 120-millimeter tank guns.

The 3rd, a major element of NATO forces in Europe, plays an essential role in maintaining world peace.

Capt. Dale K. Brudwig, commander in Company B of the division's 13th Cavalry in Kirch Gons, entered the Army in June 1957. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Carl O. Brudwig, who live at 18151 S. Gramercy Pl. A 1953 graduate of George Washington High School, in Los Angeles, Capt. Brudwig received his Bachelor's degree from the University of California at Los Angeles in 1957. Torrance Pre-Medical Student Gets Annual Chemistry Award

Rudolph N. Johnson, El Camino College pre-medical major from Torrance, was the recipient last week of the annual award made to the outstanding general chemistry student, as determined in national competition sponsored by the Chemical Rubber Co.

Johnson placed first in the Far West Region, 14th annual nationwide Achievement Award Program, sponsored by the publications division of the company.

AT A CHEMISTRY seminar recently, he received a certificate of merit from the Chemical Rubber Co.

In addition, \$100-worth of scientific books have been donated to the El Camino College library, in honor of his achievement. Each book bears a bookplate with the college name and a suitable inscription, giving credit to Johnson and the college.

JOHNSON received this award by virtue of his performance on a two-hour examination conducted in May in competition with general chemistry award winners of most of the colleges and universities in the seven western states and several Canadian colleges.

Johnson studied chemistry at El Camino College under instructors John McQuerry and Dr. Robert Long.

EL CAMINO COLLEGE has participated in the annual award program for five years. Johnson is the first El Camino student to place first in the annual competition, although two El Camino College students have placed in the top three places in the past. Jerry Buchholz, now a graduate student of the University of California at Berkeley, tied for second place in 1957; and

Jerry Hahanson, now a naval aviator, was third in 1959.

AT THE presentation ceremony Johnson also received \$50 cash award from an anonymous donor, recognizing him as the outstanding general chemistry 1A-B student for 1960-61. A year ago the award was won by Jeffrey King of the college science department.

Johnson was graduated from Hawthorne High School in 1960 and has completed two semesters at El Camino College. At the completion of his work at El Camino, he plans to transfer to UCLA. He is 19 years old and resides at 4114 W. 177th St.
