Costs of Education Head State Budget

Our 1962 budget session opened with a two-day meeting during which we received the Governor's budget message and the budget bill was introduced in each house. Then we recessed until March 7, in order to give the finance committee in the Senate and the ways and means committee in the Assembly time to review the 1962-63 expenditure program.

The total amount recommended is close to \$2.9 billion, up almost \$200 million over the approved budget for the current year, or 6.7 per cent. No new taxes are called for, though bond proceeds of \$141 million for new building will be required to balance the budget. Total state revenues for the year are estimated at \$2.7 billion, up 8 per cent.

ONCE AGAIN, California's annual state budget will top those of all the other 49. It will also surpass the total annual expenditures of at least 25 independent nations in South America, Europe, and Africa. State government is by far the biggest business enterprise in our state.

As before, the largest single item in the budget is for education. According to the Governor's message, a total of \$1.2 billion will be required for current operations during 1962-63. Of this sum \$863 million will be paid to local school districts, \$197 million will go to support the University, and \$149 million will be used for the state colleges. In addition to these amounts, the budget calls for the use of some \$110 million of bond funds for construction of educational facilities. Thus, various educational expenditures would account for 41.6 per cent of the total budget.

OTHER IMPORTANT expenditure categories include highways, \$83 million, or 20 per cent; health and welfare \$519 million, or 18 per cent; and natural resources, \$200 million, or 7 per cent. Looked at another way, the proposed budget indicates how much state financial assistance is required to relieve property taxpayers of what would otherwise be a crushing burden.

More than \$1.5 billion, 55 per cent of the total requested will go to counties, cities, and districts. School, welfare, road health and flood control work done at the local level will in part be paid for by state grants to the agencies involved.

AS USUAL the condition of the state's general fund is the prime factor in determining whether the proposed budget will be kept in balance. Total expenditures from this fund during the new fiscal year are estimated at \$1.92 billion. Revenues for the year are fixed at \$1.88 billion. A beginning of the year surplus, estimated at \$39 million, will keep the fund in balance, it is thought, and leave a tiny balance of less than \$3 million for fiscal 1963-64.

Not part of the budget proper, but affecting its balance greatly, are the proposals in the Governor's message for passage of four different state bond issues totaling \$820 million. Every voter will be interested in these. Of this amount \$100 million would be for recreation and parks, \$250 million for veterans' home loans, \$200 million for school building loans, and \$270 million for educational and other state building needs.

We legislators have a heavy responsibility to make sure that the budget finally enacted provides the highest quality of service to all Californians at the most economical price. We will do our utmost toward this end.

NOTICE TO ELECTORS OF DATE AFTER WHICH ARGUMENTS FOR OR AGAINST CITY MEASURES MAY BE SUBMITTED TO THE CITY CLERK. NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that an election is to be held in the City of Torrance on April 15, 1962 at which there will be submitted to the qualified electors of said city the following city measures:

AIRPORT REVENUE BOND PROPOSITION
This measure provides that the City may issue revenue bonds in the principal sum of \$2,000,000 for the purpose of the acquisition, construction and financing by the City of additions to and improvements (other than repairs) of the Torrance Municipal Airport and facilities appurtenant thereto.

AMENDMENT TO THE CITY CHARTER RELATING TO THE AIRPORT FUND:
This amendment: (a) provides that all moneys in the Airport Fund (derived from the operation of airport facilities) shall be used first for the payment of principal and interest on bonds of the City issued for the acquisition, construction, improvement or financing of airport facilities; and (c) provides that nothing in Article XX shall be a covenant enforceable by a bondholder.

AMENDMENT TO THE CITY CHARTER RELATING TO THE BOARD OF EDUCATION:
This amendment provides: (a) that newly elected members of the Board of Education shall take office on the first Monday in May next succeeding their election; (b) for the repeal of the Charter section providing for the election of a president and a clerk of the Board; and (c) for the repeal of the Charter sections relating to the first Board of Education election.

AMENDMENT TO THE CITY CHARTER RELATING TO THE CIVIL SERVICE SYSTEM:
This amendment: (a) provides for a continuance of the existing civil service system; (b) confers authority on the City Council by a five-sevenths vote and after consideration by the Civil Service Commission, to amend, delete or replace the provisions of any ordinance governing said system, except that the City Council may not withdraw any department service system without prior approval of the electorate.
