Chapel Grateful to Backers of Nalline

The Honorable Lester A. McMillan, Democratic Member of the Assembly from the 61st Assembly District, Los Angeles, and an attorney-at-law, recently commented on my Nalline Anti-Narcotic Law, by saying: "The Nalline testing program is beginning to pay dividends." He also announced publicly that an Assembly Sub-Committee of which he is a member has recommended that the amount of \$113,000 be included in the 1962 Budget for expanding the Nalline Anti-Narcotic testing program in Southern California to parolees attempting to avoid narcotic addiction.

At present, a person parolee from a penal institution averages 3.2 Nalline tests per month. Some get less than 3 tests, some get more, which accounts for the average of 3.2 tests per month. If the appropriation is passed as part of the budget, parolees in the Los Angeles area will get one Nalline test each week and a "surprise" test once a month to determine if he has resumed taking narcotics.

IF A PAROLEE reacts positively to the test, it shows he has violated parole by taking narcotics, his parole is cancelled and he is sent back to prison immediately.

Walter Dunbar, director, California State Department of Corrections recently praised the operation of the Nalline law which I authored when he publicly states:

"Parolees tell us this is a real club over their heads in preventing re-addiction to narcotics."

NALLINE IS A trade name for Nalorphine, a harmless drug given to determine if a person has used narcotics within the previous twenty-four hours. The Nalline testing program to which Assemblyman McMillan referred is based upon my own Assembly Bill No. 2378, which I introduced in 1959. The bill passed both houses and was signed into law by Governor Edmund G. ("Pat") Brown, who has repeatedly described it on television programs and in public addresses as "one of the most effective anti-narcotic laws in the California statutes."

Personally, I am glad to receive the public approval of Governor Brown, Assemblyman McMillan, and other Democratic Party leaders, when they are kind enough to constructively work for a law initiated by a Republican Assemblyman.

ACTUALLY, GOVERNOR Brown, Assemblyman McMillan and I must give credit where credit is due. Doctors of Medicine, Doctors of Osteopathy, and Registered Nurses living or working in Inglewood, Venice, Playa del Rey, Westchester, El Segundo, Manhattan Beach, Hermosa Beach, Redondo Beach, Torrance, Hollywood Riviera, Palos Verdes Estates, Rolling Hills, Rolling Hills Estates, Portuguese Bend, and the beautiful Santa Catalina Island are the ones who deserve all the credit and all the glory for the enactment into law of my Assembly Bill No. 2378, because these dedicated members of the healing professions were the people who wrote me hundreds of letters explaining the advantage of the enactment of the Nalline Testing Law.

Sheriff Pete Pritchess and his many fine deputy sheriffs, and the police officers of the communities named above, also deserve credit, because they, too encouraged me to introduce the Nalline bill and then followed up by getting their friends and relatives all over California to write to their own Assemblymen and State Senators, urging them to vote for my bill. Then, when the bill passed both houses of the Legislature, all these public-spirited people wrote the Governor, urging him to sign it.

THE STATE Department of Corrections requested the \$113,000 appropriation to the subcommittee mentioned above, and in it turn has recommended that the powerful Assembly Ways and Means Committee include this amount in the budget on which the Legislature will vote during March. The money will be spent to continue Nalline testing centers already successfully operating in West Los Angeles, East Los Angeles, and Huntington Park. In addition, part of the money will be spent to establish new Nalline testing centers in the Los Angeles area.

Missionary Conference Completed

The Narbonne Avenue Baptist Church of Lomita is completing a School of Missions.

A different missionary has spoken each night. The Lomita church is one of 18 churches participating in this event. There were 18 missionaries from all parts of the world here for this mission emphasis. This Sunday at the 8:30 and 10:50 a.m. services the pastor, Robert A. Wells, will speak on the subject, "Is Our Nation Christian?"

"Our church is one of over 32,000 Southern Baptist churches. We set out to establish 30,000 new churches, missions and preaching stations by 1964. We must reach this goal if we are to keep pace with the population growth of our nation," Mr. Wells will state.

At the evening service the message will be another in the series of messages especially prepared for the youth, "Are You Fit to Be Tied?"

"More thinking needs to be done before the marriage ceremony, and if there is, there will be less controversy as it is over," the pastor will state.

Service Scheduled

The Community Baptist Church of Torrance will gather Sunday morning to remember the death of the Savior in a service centering around the Lord's Table.

The pastor, Rev. Richard C. Addison, will bring a communion message entitled "Bread From Heaven," a message designed to bring the hearer to a greater understanding of the Last Supper.

The evening message is entitled "Obedient to the Faith," a message taken from one of the earliest revivals in the history of the Christian church, and one which will prepare the Community Church for its own revival.

The community is invited to attend the worship services at 11 a.m. and 7 p.m., and also to receive Christian training in the Sunday School at 9:45 a.m.


