Progress toward the September beginning of the associate degree program in nursing at El Camino College has taken a "colorful" step forward with the selection of the uniform to be worn by student nurses, Mrs. Cynthia Barnes, coordinator of nursing, announced this week.

The uniforms, pastel pink, shirt-waisted dresses with white pinafores, are dacrone and cotton weave and will be tailored to fit. Male uniforms will be white trousers and jackets.

"NOW, WITH OUR nursing faculty established and many of the administrative requirements nearing completion, we can direct our attention more fully to student applications," Mrs. Barnes said.

"In this area we would like to remind candidates that many applications are only partially complete and that all required papers must be filed before a candidate is accepted," she added.

STUDENT applications for the nursing program, to be complete, must include transcripts of all high school, college or nursing school courses, personal recommendations, the completed application form and contact with the counseling office at El

Camino for reservation dates to take required college ability and placement tests.

"We want to avoid misleading candidates and interested students who have heard rumors that the program is full. There is still time for interested persons to file applications and for others who have filed only part of their necessary papers to bring everything up to date," Mrs. Barnes concluded.
