New Style Baby Shoes Introduced

A new baby shoe that is a complete departure from the usual infant's shoe will be introduced in Southern California this week by the foot specialist who designed it, Dr. Simon J. Wikler of Miami Beach, Florida.

Author of the new book, "Take Off Your Shoes and Walk" (Devin - Adair), Dr. Wikler believes baby shoes have a lasting effect on the shape of the feet and are responsible, later on, for many foot difficulties.

His advice for healthy feet is to go barefoot every chance a person gets, and he has designed a new infant's shoe to produce this effect.

The patented last is fash-shaped to give freedom to the toes while the heel positions the foot firmly, without cramping. The balance of the shoe is made up of soft unlined uppers and a soft, flexible sole. No metal shanks nor inside seams are employed.

The philosophy, demonstrated by the design, is to give complete freedom of action to babies' feet, as near to walking barefoot as possible.

During his visit to Southern California, Dr. Wikler will present his practical approach to proper feet care at the eleven Broadway Department Stores. His appearance at the Broadway Del Amo is slated for Monday, April 2, between the hours of 10 a.m. and 5 p.m.






