Job Training Discussion Held by School Officials

The most unskilled worker can be trained to meet some need which cannot be filled by machine.

Speaking before the county Adult Education Administrators Friday at Torrance High School, Helen Wood, a labor official, discussed "Job Upgrading in the Next Decade and What Adult Education Can Do About It."

The speaker, manpower officer from the Office of Automation and Manpower, Department of Labor, Washington, D. C., said skillful guidance will

be necessary to successful retraining of workers who lose their jobs through automation.

"Vocational illiteracy" is a serious national problem among adults and this situation will become more serious as automation replaces less skilled manpower, she said.

The national administration is hopeful of bringing jobs to the workers so that workers won't have to move to the jobs, she added. It is hard to say, she said, how many persons will have to move to a new area before finding work but workers have always been a mobile population.
