

# Vote Registration Places Listed, Today Deadline

Registration for the June 5 Primary Election will close today, and all eligible residents who are not now registered voters are urged to register.

The following classes of persons should register or re-register for the election:

1. Those who have changed their addresses since they last registered.
2. Those who have changed their names since they last registered.
3. Those who desire to change their political affiliation.
4. Those voters whose registrations were cancelled because they did not vote at the General Election in 1960 and who have not re-registered since said cancellation.
5. Those who have become of age and have not registered.

6. New residents of Los Angeles County who will have the required qualifications by the date of the election. These qualifications are:
  - a. One year residence in the State.
  - b. Ninety days residence in the County.
  - c. Twenty-one years of age.
  - d. A naturalized citizen must have been a citizen for at least 90 days prior to the date of the election, and must show

his naturalization papers to the Deputy when registering for the first time.

e. All voters must be able to read the English language and sign their names, and must not be disqualified to vote by reason of a felony conviction.

Persons may register at the City Hall, 3031 Torrance Blvd., by 5 p.m. today, or they may register with a field deputy in their neighborhood. Deputies will also be registering voters

in many banks, State Employment office, various markets, CMA, Certibond, and Big Ben stores.
