UCB Tops \$2 Billion In Resources

Total resources of United California Bank have increased by nearly 20 per cent during the last year, according to Frank L. King, chairman of the board. On March 31 total resources were \$2,339,152,413 compared with \$1,953,840,616 on the same date last year. Deposits rose from \$1,736,288,367 to \$2,104,011,094, an increase of 21.2 per cent. Loans moved upward from \$1,063,609,665 to \$1,270,805,122, an increase of 19.5 per cent. Net operating earnings for the first quarter of 1962 were \$2,700,508, equal to 53 cents per share. Earnings for the same period in 1961 are not comparable because of the merger of the former First Western Bank into California Bank during that period.

Success for Reds Topic Of Lecture

Dr. Robert Peterson Jr. will address a study group and the public Friday at 7:45 p.m. at the Miraleste Cafeteria at Miraleste School in Palos Verdes. He will speak on "Secrets of Soviet Success." Dr. Peterson, a major in the Air Force Reserves, taught air science and tactics for the Air Force at the University of Colorado from 1951 to 1954, and except for that time has been associated with Santa Ana schools since 1948.
