## Zone Change Hearing Set For April 30

Reasoning of property on the north side of 228th Street east of Western Avenue will be the subject of a Los Angeles City Planning Commission hearing to be held on Monday, April 30, 1962 at 9:30 a.m., in the Wilmington Branch City Hall, 411 Neptune Avenue.

The proposal to be considered is a change from the present M-1 limited industrial zone to the C-M commercial manufacturing zone on property located on the north side of 228th Street from a line 90 ft. easterly of Western Avenue to a line 582 ft. easterly of Halldale Avenue to a depth of 180 ft. Consideration of this change was initiated by the City Planning Commission because of recent restrictions in the M-1 zoning regulations.

The hearing will be conducted by City Planner Lewis P. Kipke. Following the hearing a report and recommendation will be submitted to the Commission. Final action will be up to the City Council.


## Youth Band Elects Four New Officers

## Los Verdes Golf Course To Get Park

Inclusion of a community park in the Los Verdes Golf Course development to serve residents and children of the area was authorized by County Supervisor Burton W. Chace. The Supervisor disclosed that the County will spend \$156,000 for the general development of the park section of the golf course site.

IMPROVEMENTS will include a sprinkler system and landscaping, playground and athletic facilities, a picnic area, hard courts, parking, walks and a service yard building at a cost of approximately \$100,000.

In addition, a recreation activity building will be provided at a cost of more than \$50,000. Architect Edwin H. Ripperdan of Long Beach, noted recreation design specialist, was appointed to prepare plans for the development.

CHACE SAID the County plans to break ground for construction of the golf course and club house in July of this year. The County Retirement Board recently agreed to finance construction of Los Verdes and several other golf courses under the terms of a 30-year lease.

According to County Manager L. S. Hollinger, the lease will be consummated in about 30 days. At the present time the Retirement Board as well as the County are procuring appraisals on which the lease terms will be made.
