## Dean for College Announced

Appointment of Dr. Harry A. Nethery, assistant superintendent for the Cupertino

School District in Santa Clara, as dean of facilities planning for the new four-year state college in this area has been announced by Dr. Leo F. Cain, president.

Dr. Nethery has been asso-

ciated with the Cupertino district for five years, and has participated in the district's building development program, Dr. Cain said. He holds a master's degree in business administration from Harvard and

received his bachelor's and doctor's degrees at Stanford.

The new dean has had extensive experience in planning and building new schools, Dr. Cain said. His new assignment here will be concerned with planning and development of buildings for the new state college.

The new college is scheduled to open in September, 1964, on a site to be selected soon.

## Admissions Dean Named For College

Dr. Peter D. Ellis has been named associate dean of admissions at South Bay State College scheduled to open in the fall of 1964.

Dr. Ellis has a bachelor's degree in Economics from UCLA and received his doctor's degree from the same institution in 1961. ## Woodcraft Rangers to Show Project at Exhibit Center

The Brave Eagle Tribe of Woodcraft Rangers, under the direction of Guide Maurice Turling of 21923 Dolores St., will display its handicraft project in the Pow Wow in conjunction with the fifth annual Great Western Fair and Dairy Show to be held May 25 to 30 at the Great Western Exhibit Center, Santa Ana Freeway and Atlantic Blvd.

According to Charles J. Lump, president of the 48th District Agricultural Assn., sponsor of the event, more entries have been received this year than ever before. More than 2,000 dairy animals will be competing for the \$60,000 in premiums.

In addition to the animals, the show will feature enter-

tainment for the entire family. Popular Judy Canova will head the stage show, there will be a collegiate Rodeo, and E. K. Brothers Circus will provide laughs and thrills for children of all ages.

FREE SAMPLES of dairy products, contests galore, and loads of events will make this year's fair the top event for the Memorial Day weekend.

Children are admitted free, and there is a 50-cent charge for adults. All entertainment is included in the admission. Hours are 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. daily.

## Two Summer Sessions Set At El Camino

To serve the community and utilize campus facilities to a maximum extent, two summer sessions will be offered this year at El Camino College.

By adding a four-week post session to follow the regularly scheduled six-week summer session, the college begins for the first time in its history a year-round school program.

"Persons planning to enroll in either or both of the summer sessions should remember that these sessions concentrate in a very short period of time the equivalent of a full semester of academic work," Leo Christian, registrar, said.

THE SIX-WEEK session will offer both morning and evening classes with a limitation of six units of work per student. Registration is open to any person who is 18 years of age or older or who is a high school graduate.


No district requirement or fee will be charged for this registration, although the cost of books and supplies must be borne by the student.

Placement tests, if required, must be completed three school days prior to registration. Reservations for these tests will be available in the Counseling Office beginning Tuesday.

FOR STUDENTS who have completed the spring semester at El Camino, registration will be conducted June 18 from 1 to 3 and 5:30 to 7 p.m. New and former students will register during the same hours of the day following, June 19. Classes begin June 20 and end Aug. 1.

The second summer session of four weeks duration offers a schedule of morning classes only. For this session, registrants must be legal residents of the El Camino College district or Los Angeles contract area.

REQUIREMENTS of age and testing are the same as those for the first session.
