The final concert of the present Civic Symphony season was given Saturday evening at Redondo High School Auditorium, under the inspired leadership of Elyse Aehele who drew from the orchestra an evening of brilliant music.

From the masterly, polyphonic "Overture to Medea" by Cherubini, which deserves to be heard more frequently, to the rousing March from "Tannhauser," the orchestra seemed imbued with the true spirit of great music, a fact

which was enthusiastically appreciated by the large audience.

Particularly admired was the "Adagietto" for strings alone from the Bizet "L'Arlesienne" suite. This was played with poetic delicacy. Finlandia was also well received. Although Maestro Aehele lacked some of her musicians due to illness, the orchestra played with full tone and power.

FLAUTIST Harry Nelson received a long ovation for his solo, which he played with consummate art and grace. He is a true artist.

An unusual touch was added by the famed saxophone solo in the Bizet Overture performed by Sylvia Romm with a full but delicately sweet tone and fine classical style.

When the curtain opened on the ballet the audience gasped with pleased admiration of the beautiful costumes and artistic colors. The whole Morelli ballet offering was brilliantly danced, beautifully costumed, and enthusiastically applauded by the audience.

Patsy Norman, who is especially admired and possessively loved in this area, "stopped the show" with her exotic interpretation of "Anitra's Dance."

A BRILLIANT display of paintings from the Drawing Room of Torrance, filling the halls of the building, added a fascinating touch of bright colors and added tremendously to the pleasure of a very enjoyable evening.

Interment was in Pacific Crest Cemetery.


C. D. DE WITT


