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CRASH KILLS MOTHER OF 5

Harbor City Lad Killed In Traffic

A 35-year-old mother of five children, whose husband died as the result of a construction accident earlier this month, was fatally injured in a two-car crash at Carson Street and Normandie Avenue Monday.

Succumbing to head and internal injuries at Harbor General Hospital was Elen Castillo, 155 E. 208th St., who was reportedly on her way to the Halverson-Leavell Mortuary in Torrance to complete insurance forms in connection with her husband's death May 13 from injuries he received under a bridge column of the San Diego Freeway in the Westwood area.

INVESTIGATING officers said Mrs. Castillo was injured in a crash with a vehicle driven by Arlene Rita Fried, 33, of 1833 Florwood Ave. Alejandra Castillo, 23, of 29844 Shearer Ave., a cousin to Mrs. Castillo and an occupant of the same car, was admitted to Harbor General Hospital with a shoulder fracture.

MRS. FRIED and her son, Stephen, 3, were taken to Kaiser Foundation Hospital in Harbor City. Holy Rosary will be recited at the Halverson-Leavell Mortuary Chapel at 8 p.m. Friday and requiem mass will be celebrated at St. Philomena Catholic Church Saturday at 9 a.m. Burial will be in Holy Cross Cemetery.

Mrs. Castillo is survived by her five children, Ray, 11, John, 9, Anna Marie 7 Virginia, 4.

Nixon Due For Visit On Monday

Richard M. Nixon will visit the Torrance Nixon for Governor Headquarters Monday to meet with campaign volunteers and greet his many friends and followers. The Torrance visit will be part of a tour of Los Angeles County the day preceding the primary to be held on Tuesday.

A frequent visitor to the Torrance area during his primary campaign, Nixon will also appear tomorrow at a giant rally sponsored by the El Segundo Republican Club, Manhattan Beach Republican Club, and South Bay Young Republicans, together with other participating clubs. The rally will be held at 8 p.m. in the auditorium of the El Segundo High School, located at 640 Main St., El Segundo. A capacity audience is expected to hear Nixon speak on issues vital to the state, soon to be number one in the nation.

Chamber Gets Early Glance At New Court

Superior Judge Thomas C. Yager outlined to Torrance Chamber of Commerce members this week plans for a new \$3 million courthouse to be located in the civic center at Torrance Boulevard and Maple Avenue.

The four-story structure will contain nine court rooms, two master calendar courts and seven standard courts with jury rooms and judges' chambers, he said.

ALSO INCLUDED are facilities for the county clerk, district attorney, public defender, juvenile traffic hearings, sheriff's department and detention rooms. Two future standard courts will remain unfinished for future developments on the top floor. A fallout shelter will be located in the basement, the first fallout shelter to be built in any Superior Court Building in the county. It will accommodate 500 persons and will be supplied with emergency ventilation, lighting, heating and sanitation.

THE BUILDING will be completely air conditioned for summer and winter. Total cost of the structure, the judge said, is estimated at \$3,057,080. Judge Yager said the courthouse is being located in Torrance because as "The Greek philosopher Cleanthes said: 'Fate leads the willing, drags the unwilling.' Torrance is the home of the willing." He added, "It certainly is appropriate that the new court building be located here in what Chamber of Commerce Manager Don Reining calls the headquarters city of the Southwest district."

Sam Levy To Head Campaign

Sam Levy has been named local chairman of the "Hope Sunday" drive on June 3 for the City of Hope.

In accepting as chairman, Levy said volunteer "Citizens of Hope" will march in the one-day, door-to-door campaign for funds to help support the free, nonsectarian Medical Center's pilot program against catastrophic diseases.

"On Hope Sunday," the chairman noted, "the main source of the City of Hope's funds is found. On that day the public shows its support for the absolutely free care for patients suffering from cancer, the leukemias, blood, chest, operable heart conditions and hereditary afflictions."

The special role of the pilot medical facility in the search for new advances in patient care and research was stressed by the chairman.

It was pointed out that scores of residents from this community have received countless days of both inpatient and outpatient care at the City of Hope.

Sears Veteran Appointed Torrance Store Manager

Appointment of George G. Gaugler, a veteran of more than a quarter of a century of increasingly responsible assignments with Sears, as manager of the Torrance Sears store in the Del Amo Shopping Center was announced this week. He succeeds John G. Lowe who has been appointed as manager of the Los Angeles Retail District for the firm.

Gaugler joined Sears in Phoenix in 1935 as a salesman. He got his first supervisory assignment in 1941 when he was made division manager of men's furnishings in Tucson. He later served as merchandise manager in Las Vegas and Modesto.

THE NEW Torrance manager became assistant manager of the Modesto store in 1946 and moved to the San Jose store two years later in the same capacity.

He joined the California Zone staff as merchandising manager in 1950, was named Modesto manager in 1951 and manager at San Mateo in 1955.

Since 1959 Gaugler has been manager of the Pomona store, leaving that post to accept the assignment as Lowe's successor here. He will head up a staff of 600 in the Torrance store.

Gaugler and his wife, Anita, reside in Claremont but plan to move to the Torrance area in the near future, he told the

HERALD. The Gauglers have one daughter, Linda, who is teaching English and speech in West Covina High School. Gaugler is a member of the Kiwanis Club and Elks Lodge.

Former Editor of Herald Dies, Rites Held Tuesday

W. Harold Kingsley, editor and co-owner of The Torrance HERALD during a period of turbulent growth in Torrance—1923 to 1929—and a pioneer resident of Palos Verdes Estates died Sunday at the age of 70. He had lived at 3321 Via Palomino in Palos Verdes Estates since 1930.

A native of Flint, Mich., Mr. Kingsley was a member of the Class of '14 at the University of Michigan, and served in the Second Division during World War I. He started his newspaper career by writing for local newspapers while attending high school.

HE LATER worked on newspapers in Detroit, Toledo, Winnipeg, Akron, Grand Rapids, and on the Paris edition of the Chicago Tribune.

In 1922, Mr. Kingsley was co-publisher of the Flint Saturday Night and the Flint Tribune.

He joined the late Grover C. Whyte in acquiring the HERALD in June 1923 and served as its editor until he sold his interest to Mr. Whyte in 1929. Mr. Whyte continued as publisher until his death in 1953.

MR. KINGSLEY was appointed managing editor of the Long Beach Sun in 1930, the same year he moved to Palos Verdes Estates, and remained in that post until he was named communications officer for the Los Angeles County Department of Charities in 1933.

The following year, he was made director of public relations for the California

Teachers Assn., Southern Section, and remained until he retired in 1957 as director of public relations for the CTA.

FOLLOWING his retirement, Mr. Kingsley served as a consultant to several schools on matters of public relations.

Mr. Kingsley is survived by his widow, Vivian; sons William and John; grandsons, William and Michael, and a granddaughter, Lucy.

The service of family prayers was held Tuesday at St. Cross Episcopal Church, Hermosa Beach, and cremation was at Pacific Crest Cemetery.

The family has suggested that memorials in his name may be contributed to the Palos Verdes Scholarship Award fund, Palos Verdes High School.
