New Pacific State Bank Half Completed

Pacific State Bank's new branch in the Carson Shopping Center has reached the half-way point in construction, President Robert C. Yeary has announced.

The 7,300 square foot structure, which is being built by Ernest W. Hahn, Inc., general contractors, was inspected by Yeary; James W. Hoak, Hahn vice-president, and representatives of the Torrance Chamber of Commerce.

The brick building is scheduled for completion in September of this year, Yeary said.

DESIGNED for the greatest possible economy of construction, Pacific State's Torrance branch will have a 5,500 square foot ground floor coupled with an 1,800 square foot "floating" mezzanine. All design accents have been placed on the main entrance of the building which will be

framed by a portico of tubular steel columns supporting an overhang projection extending from the front of the building.

Of unusual interest is the contemplated use of floor-to-ceiling alternating gray and amber glass windows in the front and rear of the building—one of the few cases of such use in a commercial building.

THE OFFICE'S ground level vault structure will be used to support mechanical equipment which will be placed above it on the mezzanine.

Other interior features of the bank will include acoustical tile ceilings, recessed lighting and air conditioning and an interior color selection includes beige, soft yellow, blue and blue-gray. Modern open-type counters will be built of aluminum and wood and circular service islands will be placed in the center of the main lobby.

The bank has other offices in Hawthorne, Lennox, Windsor Hills and Rolling Hills.

Council Puts \$14,000 Into Park Project

A "surplus" of \$14,000 in the Park and Recreation fund should be used for park buildings at Paradise and La Romeria Parks, the City Council decided Wednesday night. Overruling Councilman George Vico, who had suggested that the funds be used to install lighting at Torrance Park, the city dads authorized City Manager Wade Peebles to transfer the funds into projects for the two West Torrance parks.

Vico's concern for the Torrance Park lighting system was allayed later when Peebles reported that an allocation of \$7,000 for the project set up earlier was still intact, but that the lighting had not been installed because of the press of higher priority projects.

"Good," Vico said when informed of the lighting allocation. "I know a man who will donate his time to put the lights up," he said. He did not further identify the man.

Action of the remaining \$14,000 came on a recommendation of the Rev. H. Milton Sippel of the Parks and Recreation Commission. The Rev. Mr. Sippel said the commission was trying to accumulate enough funds to build park buildings at each of the two sites, but that about \$35,000 was needed for each. He asked that an additional \$25,000 be allocated in the new budget.

On another front, the Sheriff's Department announced that a Special Enforcement Detail (SED) had been assigned to the Southwest area to aid local police departments.

THE SPECIAL detail, composed of five units, has been trained in the latest procedures for coping with teenage gangs and has been charged with the task of wiping out traces of violence which have cropped up in the area in recent weeks.

The officers, handpicked from ranks of Sheriff's depu-

ties, keep abreast of the latest techniques in handling rough situations, and return to the Sheriff's Academy once a week to practice such assignments as crowd dispersement and the use of a nightstick.

MEMBERS of SED are experts at taking charge of a situation, one Sheriff's officer said.

Torrance City Councilmen voted Wednesday night to adopt as an urgency measure an ordinance outlawing the use and possession of intoxicating liquors on Torrance beach as a further step in reducing the potential for violence in the area.
