**Stock Cars Tangle Today
In CJA Event at Gardena**

Bill Foster, Gene Davis, and Marvin Heinis will head a field of 40 cars in this afternoon's nine event CJA Stock Car racing program at Gardena's Western Speedway, where racing will begin at 2:30 p.m.

Foster, winner of seven main events last year, will be after his first triumph of the season, when he wheels his maroon Oldsmobile to the starting line today. In his last outing he finished second to his teammate Marvin Heinis, after leading the feature until the final lap.

Davis has taken two main event wins this year in his blue Olds, and was in front for 20 of the 40 laps of his last start. He finished third in that race. He will be shooting for win number three in today's 30 lap main event.

Also driving an Oldsmobile will be Heinis, winner of four feature victories this year, and on top in the battle for the 1962 CJA Stock Car championship. He will also be trying to protect his one lap track record of 17.06 or 70.339 miles per hour.

Trying to stop the Olds team will be two Dodge pilots, Jim Cook and Clem Proctor. Cook has three main event wins, while Proctor has tasted victory once. Both drivers are rated as real threats to the Oldsmobile trio's victory chances.

On the day's program will be time trials at 1 p.m.; a 15 lap Semi-Main; a 10 lap consolation; four eight-lap heat races; and a four-lap trophy dash.

Clinching the first half West Coast Slo-Pitch League crown, the Torrance Tappa Keggas battered Hawthorne 1 to 0 and 11 to 0 Friday.

The two shutouts pushed the Keggas scoreless skein to 26 innings and lifted their win mark to 49 consecutive victories.

Bryan Stephens notched the win in the opener with a two-hitter and Keggas manager Chuck Ryan carried home the second victory with a four-hit effort.

IN THE first game, the Keggas played their third straight errorless contest as Hawthorne almost kept pace, committing only two bingles.

Bill Morris led the Keggas hitting attack, slamming four hits.

El Monte, pushing the Tappas for the crown, dropped back to third as South Torrance pulled a pair of upsets, moving into the runner-up slot.

THE KNIGHT OWLS took home 4-2 and 12-3 victories. Bill LeRoy notched both wins for South.

In the second game, the Owls unleashed their vaunted hitting attack as Gary Palmer clobbered a pair of home runs and Lee Calkins and Jack Hannah each connected for the circuit.
