## Girl Scores In Latin Test


Patrice Gauder of 5515 Clearside St., a student at Bishop Montgomery High School, has won an award in a national Latin examination.

## Garrett Corp. Plans Hotel

The Garrett Corp., which has facilities in Torrance and adjacent to the Los Angeles International Airport, plans on erecting a 600-room hotel and an office building on its

land next to the airport. Within walking distance of all airline terminal buildings, the 500,000-square-foot hotel will help meet the demands of the air traveling public, J. C. Garrett, president said.

The corporation is preparing to file an application with the Los Angeles City Planning Commission requesting that a portion of its 20-acre property be rezoned for commercial usage.

## Know Your Traffic Laws

At numerous intersections in our city are green arrows which control vehicles making left turns. This type of control is the safest known control for left turning vehicles, yet numerous violations are observed every day.

In talking to violators their answer is that they were not aware that the green arrow was for, they forgot about the green arrow and pulled into the intersection because of habit, or that they just were not thinking.

Also noted at controlled intersections are numerous pedestrian violations such as crossing against the red signal and failing to comply with the pedestrian control sign which will say walk or don't walk. As a pedestrian you are required to obey all traffic laws that are applicable.

**THESE TRAFFIC** controls are installed to assist you and to give you as much protection as possible as well as controlling traffic in an orderly manner. The rest is up to you. It is you the drivers and pedestrians that must be alert and obey these controls.

### GREEN ARROW

21454. A green arrow or an official traffic control signal means that vehicular traffic facing the signal may cautiously enter the intersection to make the movement indicated by the green arrow but shall yield the right-of-way to other vehicles and to pedestrians lawfully within the intersection or an adjacent crosswalk at the time such green arrow is exhibited. Vehicular traffic may make a semicircular or U-turn only where such turn is permitted by signs erected at such location. A green arrow may be displayed alone or with red, yellow or green. It is unlawful to operate a traffic signal which is equipped with a green light and a red arrow which are shown simultaneously.

### WALK, WAIT, OR DONT WALK

21456. Whenever an official traffic control signal exhibiting the words "walk" or "wait" or "don't walk" are in place, the signals shall indicate as follows:

(a) Walk. A pedestrian facing the signal may proceed across the roadway in the direction of the signal or in a diagonal direction across the roadway within the intersection if so instructed by signs or signals installed at or near the intersection.

(b) Wait or Don't Walk. No pedestrian shall start to cross the roadway in the direction of such signal, but any pedestrian who has partially completed his crossing on the

"walk" signal shall proceed to a sidewalk, safety zone or island while the "wait" or "don't walk" signal is showing.

### PEDESTRIAN TRAFFIC CONTROL

21456.1. Whenever an official traffic control signal exhibiting the words "walk" or "wait" or "don't walk" is shown concurrently with official traffic control signals exhibiting the words "go," "caution" or "stop," or exhibiting different colored lights successively, one at a time or with arrows, a pedestrian facing such traffic control signals shall obey the "walk," "wait" or "don't walk" control signal as provided in Section 21456.

## Flood Control Projects Rushed All Over County

Flood control construction contracts totaling more than \$50 million are now under way in widespread areas of the Los Angeles Basin, Supervisor Burton W. Chace has reported. Private contractors are performing the work under supervision of County Flood Control District Chief Engineer M. E. Salsbury.

Included are projects being built as a part of two storm drain bond issue programs and the District's regular flood control construction, Chace said.

**THE ARMY** Corps of Engineers is also engaged in a heavy construction effort which is closely coordinated with the District program. Overall aim is to reduce the historic flood danger in the

Los Angeles Basin during winter months.

Supervisor Chace said many areas in the Fourth Supervisorial District are expected to benefit from drainage projects now being built.

These include, along with their contract costs, the following storm drains: Walteria and Unit 2 of Torrance, \$1,015,793.50; Manhattan Beach, \$938,440; Walgrove Avenue in Santa Monica, \$434,168; El Segundo Unit 1, \$1,199,987.40; the first units of West and North Long Beach, \$943,390; Alamos Bay in Long Beach, \$938,367; and Gaffey Street in San Pedro-Wilmington, Unit 2, \$1,297,533.50.

FINANCING of these projects was provided for in two bond issues which provided more than \$400 million for construction of 324 storm drains in critical County locations.

Contracts for regular flood control work now under way in the Fourth District include Ballona Creek from Pacific Avenue to La Salle Street, \$1,584,867.50; and Dominguez to Wilmington Avenue, \$6,506,215.50. Chace added.
