First Lutheran Church Slates Organ Recital

The Ministry of Music Department of First Lutheran Church will present organist Wayne Allen in Recital on Sunday at 4 p.m. in the Sanctuary of the church at 1725 Flower.

Allen will be assisted by baritone Gerald Pierson, who is completing his year of Internship at the church.

A graduate of Pepperdine College and now a member of the faculty of the Music Department of Centinella Valley Union High School, Allen will play music from the time of Bach to the present day. One of the numbers, "Thy Spirit Be Joyful" by Bach, will be accompanied by two trumpets.

Pierson is a graduate of Augustana College and was a member of its famous College Choir, and did solo work with that group. He is currently completing his year of Internship at First Lutheran as part of his curriculum at Wartburg Seminary, Dubuque, Iowa.

He will be heard in solos by Bach, Handel, Mendelssohn, Franck and contemporary composers. One composition for organ and two compositions for solo voice written by Wallace R. Herrewig, Minister of Music of First Lutheran Church, will be presented.

Adventists Sign Scroll For Exhibition

"Local signatures of a world-wide campaign to effect greater moral responsibility in everyday life have been placed on a giant scroll for exhibition in San Francisco on July 26," David deWaal, temperance director of the Torrance Seventh-day Adventist Church announced.

"The local signatures, representing members of the 260-member Adventist Church, were attached to a scroll from 84 Southland Adventist churches before being sent to Washington, D.C., where they were affixed to the world-wide scroll," deWaal explained.

deWaal continued, "This scroll expressed the dedication of more than 1,000,000 persons in 196 countries around the world to high moral principles which view the body as the temple of God and as such believe it should not be violated through any form of intemperance." According to the director, the giant scroll will be put on public display at the Adventists' 49th quadrennial world conference being held from July 26 through Aug. 4 in the Bay City.

CTA Backs Richardson

Dr. Ralph Richardson, Los Angeles Board of Education president and UCLA faculty member, scored an overwhelming victory by nearly 10 to 1 in a plebiscite of the California Teachers Assn.'s governing council and captured the CTA endorsement for State Superintendent of Public Instruction.

These results, which assure Richardson of the CTA's active support during the campaign, were announced by Mrs. Sarah Carter, Eureka High School English teacher and president of the 125,000-member state teachers organization. "The CTA support is based solely on Dr. Richardson's publicly discussed platform, and is a clear expression of confidence in his devotion to maintaining and improving California's strong public school system," Mrs. Carter said.


Nativity Church Presents Movies On American Way
