

Knight Owls Split With Gardena

Keggas Capture Pair, Catch Up With South

Throwing the West Coast Slo-Pitch League into a scramble, Gardena and South Torrance split a pair of contests Friday night and the Tappa Keggas won two.

South and the Keggas are now deadlocked for first with 5-1 slates. Gardena is in second with a 4-2 record. The South Knight Owls and the Kegs will square off Friday at Torrance Park to decide the league leadership.

If the two local clubs split, and Gardena wins its contests against El Monte, the circuit would be placed in a three-way tie.

SOUTH TORRANCE wallopped the Bulls, 6 to 3, in the first

contest, but dropped the second encounter, 8 to 5.

Gene Leroy bested Brian Tully in the opener, throwing a six-hitter to the loser's 10-hit effort. Tully came back in the second tilt to limit the Owls to eight hits and whip Jim Hanny, who allowed 10 safeties.

LARRY BOMBKE and Jerry Schipper shared opening game hitting honors for the local entry. Both went 3 for 3.


In the second contest, the Bulls sent 10 men to bat in the opening frame and pushed across five runs. South scored one marker in the fourth and shoved the others across in a final-inning rally.

ANDY ANDERSON, at bat only twice in the second game, hit a home run and a single for the Owls. Jerry Schipper went 2 for 3.

The Tappa Keggas won both contests in rather unspectacular style. Chuck Ryan pitched both wins, boosting his record to 6-0 for the year.

THE KEGGAS won the opener, 10 to 5, and took an 8-2 victory in the nightcap. In the first tilt, Santa Ana scored four times in the final inning on four Keg errors.

Swimmers Help Redondo Celebrate 70th Birthday

Swimming moves into the spotlight tomorrow as Redondo Beach continues its 70th anniversary celebration.

El Segundo's Roy Saari, considered by many as the world's fastest water-borne human, will try to stave off several national and world champions in a rough water swim tomorrow at 11 a.m.

The race, 2½ miles long, begins on the south side of the Redondo Beach Pier and will finish at that spot.

BOB HUGHES, two-time Olympic games swimming and water polo star, will defend his lifeguard "Iron-Man" title against a long list of Southern California's finest lifeguard talent.

Chief lifeguard Bud Stevenson, the "Archie Moore" of dory rowing, is contemplating a comeback in the one-mile dory race.

10 a.m. and the final contest will get underway at 2 p.m. tomorrow.

ANOTHER highlight will be a boat parade at noon Wednesday off King Harbor. Over 50 decorated boats will start the parade off of the entrance to the harbor. Trophies will be given to winners in the several categories.

Six Navy vessels will pay tribute to the celebration. The six minesweepers go on a seven-day display beginning tomorrow in King Harbor. The public can board the boats from 1 p.m. to 6 p.m., except Wednesday and Saturday when the starting time will be 10 a.m.

Wales Shutout Gives Giants Tordondo Win


Sixteen Giants went down on strikes as Glen Wales gave up only two hits and one walk in hurling the Seals to an 11-0 Tordondo Little League victory.
