 reached \$60,066.62 for the past year.
 A Pacific Telephone representative said Torrance should educate its employes on the correct use of the telephone to get the most out of its communication dollar.
 The district pays a base service charge of \$4,006.75 a month now, a fee, according to the telephone representative, that

cannot be cut because of federal ordinance.
 Dr. Hull said the administration had taken one phone out of each elementary school in an attempt to reduce the bill.
BOARD MEMBER Bert Lynn suggested the possibility of a short wave radio hook-up. But, the telephone representative squelched the idea, saying the district would run into trouble with the Federal Communication Commission.
 In other action, the board decided to experiment with the

effectiveness of a longer day for the third grade and set attendance hours from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.
 The Trustees also authorized the appointment of two new elementary vice-principal positions.
LYNN SAID the board "looked with favor on larger schools, and did not want to take a chance on crippling them."
 The board also received a report on summer school enrollment. Total attendance has reached 11,241, over one-third of the total school enrollment for the regular year.
 An increase of 755 over last year, there are 7,872 attending the elementary grades and 3,369 in secondary schools.
