Savings Are Near Billion Dollar Mark

Home Savings and Loan Assn., already the nation's first single savings and loan firm to achieve a billion dollars in assets, will soon record another milestone in the industry — a billion dollars in savings accounts, according to Kenneth D. Childs, Home's president.

A six-month statement for the period ended June 1, showed Home Savings' assets to have increased \$152,727,833 over the same date last year for a national record breaking total of \$1,095,845,195.

The report also revealed savings accounts now stand at \$963,848,315, a 17 per cent or \$139,744,644 increase over the six-month mark ended June 1, 1961.

Real estate loans have increased \$138,943,129 from \$787,203,120 to \$926,146,249 during the past 12 months. Of the current total, \$328,925,481 are government guaranteed or insured loans.

HOME'S reserves, a resource which makes it the nation's strongest and most secure savings and loan association, grew from \$75,470,259 to \$92,052,678 during the past 12 months.

Childs also announced that Home Savings will continue to pay 4 1/2 per cent on savings accounts in all of its offices in Southern California during the third quarter beginning July 1.

Home continues its expansion and construction program and will open two new offices in the next 90 days. The new Whittier office, 15625 E. Whittier Blvd. opened recently. In August the new Pasadena office will debut at 860 E. Colorado Blvd.

In addition to Home's two new offices, construction will begin this August on a six-story building in Pomona and a new building for the Burbank office in September.

City Share Of License Fees Paid

This city's share of the state vehicle license fees totaled \$528,501, according to figures released by the State Comptroller's Office this week. A June payment of nearly \$127,000 was made.

The money, allotted on a population basis to cities and counties, is returned to the cities in lieu of a property tax on motor vehicles.

Torrance received a \$399,000 advance on the June apportionment in April.

A total of \$123 million was apportioned during the year, according to the fiscal year report. Los Angeles county received an apportionment of more than \$25 million. The lion's share went to the county's five largest cities.
