Law in Action

During a trial the court may take "judicial notice" of certain facts that need not then be proved.

Facts of common knowledge; certain practices peculiar to the community. Certain temperatures or new moons on a given date. Certain freeways are congested; facts of science, history, and geography or World War II shortage of cars, houses, and short goods.

never enforced, it was unlikely that anybody would be prosecuted under it. Every state has old laws to set moral standards, and most of them are ignored. Yet no court is likely to say these laws are invalid until someone tries to enforce them.

A judge has much freedom as to facts he may notice judicially. He may do so by accepting certain well known facts as true, or he may call in experts to help him get at the facts for judicial recognition.

IN THE CASE of one law, the U.S. Supreme court noted that for 80 years a certain law had only 30 prosecutions under it. Since it was almost

HIGHER COURTS may review the facts that the trial court takes judicial notice of, and say whether or not it was wrong in not requiring proof.

The courts favor judicial notice as a way to save time, for it eliminates the need to present evidence to prove a fact, but generally, the court will give the opposing side an opportunity to disprove the fact if it wishes to do so.

June Report Shows Assets On Increase

New highs in assets, savings, mortgage loans and interest payments to savers were reached at mid-year by Great Western Savings and Loan Assn., it was announced by Dennis J. Chojnacki, manager of the South Bay office.

Total assets on June 30, last, amounted to \$483,158,000 compared with \$411,497,000 on the same date a year ago. This was an increase of \$71,661,000, or 17.4 per cent.

Total savings amounted to \$372,924,000, against \$318,897,000 a year ago, a gain of \$54,027,000 or 16.9 per cent. Mortgage loans outstanding were \$419,657,000, an increase of 13.6 per cent over the \$369,452,000 reported on June 30, 1961.

Interest payments to savers during the first half of 1962 totaled \$7,704,000. This was at the rate of 4 3/4 per cent during the second quarter of the year. This same rate has been announced for the third quarter.
