Park Building Is Project For Victor Woman's Club

A recreation building for the Victor Park is the goal set by members of the Victor Woman's club. The club was instrumental in petitioning for this park's development, which will begin this year with a \$35,000 allocation from the Park and Recreation fund. With the park development underway, club members surveyed the area, and found a dire need for a building where youth as well as adults could hold their meetings.

In petitioning for park development, Donald Walker, landscape designer and husband of Mrs. Mary Walker, president of the Victor Woman's club, drew the master plan for the park and donated it to the city.

Surveying the area, the club found that the Recreation Department has five buildings—Walteria, Seaside, El Retiro, El Nido and McMasters—in which meetings are scheduled morning, noon and night, with many organi-

zations turned away.

The Torrance Recreation Department offers outstanding activities for all ages, states Mrs. Walker, but transportation to areas where they are offered is difficult.

Biff Walker, member of the Hollywood Riviera Rotary club, which has now started a building in El Retiro Park, met with the philanthropic committee of the Victor club. He pointed out how costs could be cut to a minimum

with the use of donated materials and the building plans drawn up by Chet Smith, Rotarian. The Rotary club has donated the use of the building plans.

Mrs. Bud Lawn is serving as philanthropic chairman. Working with her are Mmes. W. A. Pollock, Ivar Lundeen, John Galvin, and Wendell J. Thompson. Other committee members for the project are Mmes. Donald Walker, James Bruno, Richard Champion and T. A. Blanke.

Husbands, who will serve as consultants, are W. A. Pollock, architectural designer and Ivar Lundeen, general building contractor.
