pany's nearly 155 workers soon.

In the meantime, voting has been under way at the Shell Chemical Co. plant here over the weekend. Balloting started Friday under the auspices of the NLRB to determine whether workers wanted to affiliate with Bridges' ILWU or remain unaffiliated. In an earlier election, the two choices won out over affiliation with the OCAW and the International Chemical Workers Union.

Balloting will continue Monday at Shell and results will be known late Monday or Tuesday morning.

SHELL CHEMICAL CO. employees have been unaffiliated since the company purchased the plant from the General Services Administration in 1955. At that time, employees voted against affiliation with a labor organization.

Employees at the Union Carbide and Chemicals Co. plant have rejected bids to become affiliated with a union since the plant was established here.
