

El Camino College Bolsters Staff for September Term

Two music instructors, a librarian, and new instructor in art, home economics and cosmetology will be among additions to the El Camino College faculty when classes assemble Sept. 11 for the fall semester.

Joining the instructional division headed by Harold Wennstrom, Ralph L. Mills and Miss Jane Skinner will join the music faculty. Mills will direct the college community orchestra and teach classes in music appreciation and instrumental music. Miss Skinner will direct the college choir and vocal ensemble and instruct courses in music fundamentals and music appreciation.

Coming to the college with eight years of secondary school teaching experience in band, choir and orchestral work, Mills also has served as music director of a large church in Texas, where he has taught in the Lamesa, Odessa, and Midland schools. His most recent teaching was at Garden Grove, where he led the band and orchestra in Bolsa Grande High School.

MILLS' educational background includes work at Arlington State College in Texas, San Jose State College, McMurray College in Abilene, Tex., where he received his bachelor of science degree, and at the University of Southern California, from which he received a master's degree in music. He is completing work for the doctorate at USC at present.

With 12 years of experience in teaching choral music, Miss Skinner comes directly from Philadelphia, where she was employed for the past year as a staff member of Singing City. Educated at Pomona College of the Pacific, and USC, she has taught in California schools of El Monte and Los Angeles. Her most recent teaching experience was at USC.

RAY B. ENGELKE of Glendale will become a member of the college library staff, after holding a similar position at Los Angeles Valley College in a student capacity.

On completion of work toward the associate in arts degree at Los Angeles City College, Engelke received his BA in political science from the University of California at Los Angeles. Working in the graduate library school of USC, he obtained his master of science in library science and his librarianship credential through that university.

LAWRENCE R. MACARAY, a part-time instructor at El Camino during the past year while teaching in the Torrance secondary schools, will become a full-time member of the art department, also headed by Wennstrom.

A graduate of Santa Ana College, where he received his associate in arts degree, Macaray received his master's in art from Long Beach State College and his bachelor's degree from Whittier College. He also studied at Marietta College in Ohio.

BEFORE TEACHING at Torrance High School, he was a member of the faculty of Long Beach Poly High. He has also operated his own business, the Larry Macaray Art Service, in Anaheim.

Mrs. Jessie Buck, a native of Mississippi and now a resident of Hermosa Beach, will become a full-time member of the cosmetology faculty in the technical arts division, headed by Horace Bates.

New Class HJC Plans In Chemistry

Chemical Glass Manipulation, a new course in Chemical Technology, will be offered for the first time at Harbor College during the fall semester, according to an announcement today by George Rainey, chairman of the applied technology division.

The class will meet on Monday and Wednesday evenings from 6:30 to 9:30 beginning Monday, Sept. 17.

Glass Manipulation is a six-hour laboratory class emphasizing elementary techniques and practices of the manipulation and fabrication of simple

laboratory apparatus from heat resistant glass. The operations of bending, cutting, grinding, pulling and joining glass are included in the course. Students will be required to fabricate basic laboratory glassware.

PEDRO V. AGUIRRE, instructor for the class, has an extensive background in chemical glass repair and fabrication, having been employed for more than 30 years with the Union Oil Co. in charge of this technical area. Mr. Aguirre is a member of

the American Glass Blowers' Society.

Registration for the course is by appointment. Sept. 7 is the last date to file an application for registration. New students must also take the entrance-guidance test. Further information may be obtained at the College Admissions Office or by phoning TE 4-8581.


Bekins Storage Revenues Climb
