

UCLA Extension Offers World Culture Series

To review for South Bay audiences the cultures and civilizations of North and South America that existed before the coming of the European, University Extension at UCLA this fall will present a series of 12 Monday evening lectures on "World Arts and Cultures: The Americas" starting Sept. 17 at North High School, 3620 W. 182nd St.

"Following successful programs on Europe and the Orient which University Extension already has given here, this new World Arts and Culture series now examines the

nature arts of the Americas in relation to the creative environment from which they stem and their continuing influence in the world today," says Richard D. Guengrich, principal of the high school and University Extension representative in the area.

"IN THE lectures, a group of specialists will analyze the various art styles of these peoples and the relationship of their art to the particular periods, cultures and areas in which they lived." The series is divided into

parts of six lectures each, which may be attended either for six lecture sessions or the entire series of twelve. Credit is available for teachers by attending the complete series plus two additional meetings.

Speakers at the initial Sept. 17 session are Jay D. Frierman, program coordinator and associate professor of art at East Los Angeles College, whose topic is "The Arts of the Americas," and Carl Dentzel, director of the Southwest Museum, Los Angeles, who will speak on "The Importance of Indian Culture."

OTHER speakers in the series will include Ralph C. Altman, lecturer in art at UCLA; Edmund Carpenter, associate professor of anthropology at San Fernando Valley State College; P. T. Furst, writer; John Grant, associate professor of anthropology at East Los Angeles College; and Council S. Taylor, assistant professor of anthropology at UCLA.

Law in Action

Freedom of the press and speech we think of as applying to mass media like newspaper, radio, and television. But the law stands up for the soap box orator, the door bell buster, and that man on the street corner who hands you a pamphlet.

As a riot, only if the speech incites riot, confuses traffic, or disrupts the public seriously can the police stop the speaker. Certainly they cannot for talking peacefully to small groups.

THE house-to-house speaker may give you a pain in the neck, but if he does not solicit business nor money the law won't stop him. His way of spreading thought is basic.

Handbills passed out in the streets are protected too, even though the poor man's pamphlets may litter the streets after people take them. Cities may limit commercial handbills, and the law can punish litterbugs.

Recently one city required every pamphleteer to put his name and address on pamphlets. The court found this reasonable. It did not violate free speech and it did hold the sponsor accountable.

The sound truck has often been called the poor man's forum which cities cannot ban just because they annoy people. But cities can regulate them reasonably.

Free speech protects political, social, and religious interests. Courts strike down laws that allow the government to tell us what ideas citizens may read or hear.
