Popular German Recipes Shared by Mrs. Knobloch, New Torrance Resident

International cuisine can be enjoyed by local families as many of the new residents of Torrance bring with them recipes from their homelands.

Today's guest cook in the HERALD'S Favorite Recipe column is Mrs. Gunter Knobloch, who, with her husband, bought their home at 2833 Onrado in July 1960.

Mrs. Knobloch is of German origin, born in Leipzig, Rumania. While quite young her family moved to Hamburg, Germany, where she completed her education. In 1952, she and her parents moved to Winnipeg, Canada. She met her husband in Winnipeg. They were married there in 1952 and soon moved to California.

In Los Angeles, the guest cook worked as a secretary for a manufacturing firm for three years. She was a mem-

ber of the McCulloch Business Women's Club.

Mr. Knobloch is from Frankfurt, Germany, and works as passenger service supervisor for the Scandinavian Airlines System at the International Airport.

On July 16, the couple welcomed their first child, a son, Bryan John, born at South Bay Hospital.

Mrs. Knobloch's parents, who still live in Winnipeg, will arrive in Torrance this fall for a visit with their grandson.

For today's recipe column, Mrs. Knobloch has chosen three authentic German dishes to share with local housewives so that they may add a "something different" to their menu planning. The potato dumplings with the Sweet-Sour Red Cabbage is a complete German meal and Mrs. Knobloch also furnishes a dessert recipe.

POTATO DUMPLINGS

- 6 Med. potatoes
- 2 Slices white bread
- 1 Egg
- 1/4 C Plus 2 tsp. Gold Medal flour

Pare and boil potatoes until tender. Put through ricer while hot. Let cool. Meanwhile, cut bread into small cubes and toast in two tablespoons butter melted in skillet until golden brown.

When potatoes are cool, blend in egg, flour and salt to taste. Form potato mixture into 8 to 10 balls, placing three cubes of toasted bread in center of each ball. Gently place the balls in boiling salted water and simmer 10 to 15 minutes until light and fluffy. Makes 8 to 10 dumplings.

SWEET-SOUR RED CABBAGE

- 1 Med. cabbage (About 2 lbs.)
- 1 Small onion (Diced)
- 1 Apple (Cut in quarters)
- 1 1/4 C Water
- 1/2 C Mild vinegar
- 1 Tsp. sugar
- 4 Whole cloves
- Salt and pepper
- 2 Tbsp. flour

Grate and slice cabbage into small pieces. Brown onion in 2 tsp. shortening. Add all ingredients except flour. Cover. Cook until cabbage is tender, about one hour. Thicken cabbage with the flour. Six servings.

BIENENSTICH (Cake)

- 3/4 Lb. Flour
- 1/4 Lb. Margarine
- 1/4 Lb. Sugar
- 2 Eggs
- 1 Pt. Milk
- 2 Pkg. Yeast

Combine flour, margarine, sugar, eggs and milk with electric mixer on low speed. Add to this, two packages of Fleischmann's yeast, which has been moistened according to directions on package. Stir well and let stand for about 30 minutes. Prick dough as you would for pie crust to let air bubbles out. Dough will be soft and moist.

- 1/4 Lb. Butter
- 1 Tsp. Vanilla
- 1/2 Lb. Sugar
- 1/4 Lb. Almonds (Peeled and chopped)
- 2 Tbsp. milk

Combine butter, sugar and vanilla with milk and heat slowly until butter melts and mix well. Then fold in almonds. Remove from stove and let cool to lukewarm.

Place dough in pan, approximately 1/2 inch thick. Spread topping on dough and bake at 325 degrees for 25 minutes until top gets golden brown.

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
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
