Celebrating its 10th anniversary this week in Manhattan Beach is The Pen & Quill, nationally famous restaurant that last March burgeoned into a luxurious business-resort hotel and prominent South Bay landmark.

The Pen & Quill, where owner Robert Reuben has greeted friends and hungry wayfarers since 1952, became known from its very beginning as a dining place "where

world travelers meet." This slogan was inspired not only by its proximity to the international airport, but by Reuben's countless globe-trotting friends who made the restaurant their favorite rendezvous while in the Southland.

Nearness to aerospace, aircraft, missile and electronics industries has been a big factor in the success of The Pen & Quill. Its periodic expansion, like its continuous popularity, has notably kept pace with the skyrocket growth of its space-age neighbors.

Reuben, who gave up a career as a foreign and war correspondent for a decade starting for NBC and writing for Reuter's of London, opened The Pen & Quill in late September of 1952. Immediate success necessitated physical expansion, so six years ago the original one-story restaurant began its first phase of growth. The seating capacity quadrupled with the completion in 1956 of the enlarged \$350,000 Pen & Quill.

Earlier this year that remodeled establishment, which modestly began as a \$50,000 restaurant, became the present \$2 million hotel-restaurant.
