

Kennedy Praised for Cuba Action by King

Congressman Cecil R. King yesterday admonished critics of the Administration's foreign policy "to realize that there is considerable activity continuing going on that cannot be made public without giving aid and comfort to our enemy."

The veteran 17th district legislator made his remarks at a Gardena breakfast meeting in his first public appearance following return from a se-

cret briefing held in San Francisco where Western congressmen and governors were given the facts surrounding President Kennedy's declaration of a blockade of Cuba.

"WHILE critics of the Administration were crying for instant action against Cuba, President Kennedy was quietly getting the detailed evidence

and laying the necessary groundwork that brought about unanimous approval and support of all Latin American governments, important to the success of the United States action," King declared.

He praised President Kennedy for the carefully laid plans and skillful execution of the Cuban action, and told of how the daily air photos of the

missile sites from the first sign of activity to the final camouflage provided conclusive evidence.

"Those who would be critical of our government at these crucial times should realize that there is much activity that cannot be made public in advance, for to do so would only give aid and comfort to our enemy," King said.


by Dillon at the awards session.
