Some of these people have active tuberculosis and don't know it. These careless and thoughtless individuals could re-infect US so, Ann, maybe the former T.B. patient should run from them. — DENVER J. H.

**Pizza with Green Salad Topped Off by a Waldorf Family's Favorite Menu**

A pizza, which has become a favorite with the teenagers of America, also tops the list of popular food at the home of Rev. and Mrs. Gilbert Zimmerman, 1427 El Prado.

With four children in the family, youth group parties and all the entertaining a minister's wife must do, Mrs. Zimmerman has selected the pizza with a tossed green salad and a Waldorf salad dessert as her most popular menu.

The Zimmerman children are Ginger, 16, junior at Torrance High; Dan, 14, freshman at Torrance High; Marc, 12, seventh grader; and Mike, 10, first grader at Torrance Elementary.

The couple was married in 1942. They met at Colorado State College at Greeley while Mrs. Zimmerman was preparing to be a teacher and Mr. Zimmerman was a pre-theological student.

After their marriage they

came to California where Mr. Zimmerman resumed his education at Redlands from which he received his BA degree. Continuing his theological training at Boston University, the couple was on the East Coast for three years. Ginger was born in Boston in 1946 and a year later, the trio returned to California to begin Rev. Zimmerman's ministry in California-Arizona Conference at Encinitas.

In the years that followed Rev. Zimmerman's appointments were to San Diego, San Luis Obispo and then to St. Mark's in Los Angeles prior to coming to Torrance about six years ago.

Today's guest cook in the HERALD's Recipe Column, finds time from her duties as a minister's wife, mother and homemaker to teach in the church school and to attend classes at El Camino and Long Beach State College. Her favorite recipes follow:

**PIZZA PIE**

- Crust:  
1 cup warm water  
1 pkg. dry yeast  
1 tsp. sugar  
2 tsp. olive oil  
3 1/2 cups sifted flour

Measure water into bowl, sprinkle in yeast. Stir until dissolved, add sugar, salt. Beat in 2 cups flour. When smooth, stir in enough flour to make a dough. Nead until smooth and elastic on floured board.

Place in greased bowl, brush top with oil, cover. Let rise in warm place until double, about 45 minutes. Punch down, divide in half. Form each into ball, roll balls in circle to fit 12 inch pizza pan, ridge one-half inch high.

- Filling:  
2 tsp. olive oil  
1 med. onion  
1 clove garlic, minced  
1 can tomatoes (solid pack)  
1 tsp. oregano  
1 tsp. salt  
1/4 tsp. pepper

Saute onion, garlic in oil, add drained tomatoes, salt, oregano and pepper. Simmer slowly.

Start by slicing 1/2 pound of mozzarella cheese over dough, spread filling on top. Sprinkle 1/2 parmesan cheese and a little crushed oregano. Garnish with pepperoni, sausage, anchovies or other favorites.

Serve with a tossed green salad, made by mixing crisp green and yellow vegetables. Offer choice of dressings.

**WALDORF SALAD**

- 2 cups red apples (unpeeled)  
1 cup celery (diced)  
2 bananas (diced)  
1 cup marshmallows  
1/2 cup walnuts  
1/2 cup whipped cream  
1/2 cup mayonnaise

Mix all ingredients in large bowl. Place in refrigerator to chill for 30 minutes. Serves about 6.
