## World's Top Drivers Try New British Cars

The peace and quiet of the San Carlos Ranch in Carmel Valley was shattered last week by the roar of new cars in the hands of the world's greatest drivers.

Grazing cattle and other fauna may have been unnerved by the excitement but the 500 guests and the drivers had themselves a ball at the specially-built track. Among those attending were Doug Anderson of The HERALD and Bob Greenwald of Newcastle Sports Car Centre, Hermosa.

The occasion was British Motor Corp.'s "Operation 850 Plus." The great drivers were Juan Manuel Fangio, five-time world champion from Argentina; Stirling Moss, England; Dan Gurney, United States; Innes Ireland, Scotland; Roger Ward, of Indianapolis fame; Pedro Rodriguez, Mexico; Denise McCluggage, America's outstanding woman driver, and Jack Flaherty of Monterey. They wheeled the four latest models of BMC cars around the track in four separate races, took them over a rugged obstacle course and then drove members of the press and leading businessmen.

**THE ALL-DAY** affair was a gala occasion with specially-invited members of the press, radio, and television coming from all over California, the Northwest and Nevada to see in action for the first time the new MGB, the MG Sedan, the Austin 850 and the Austin Cooper.

Drivers and cars competed for attention as preparations were made for the races, but when they took off in the first event of the day around the course, the two sets of "stars" merged into one. Drivers and cars seemed to be part of one another.

As the experts wheeled the new models around the track, there was no doubt about why

BMC had given these cars top billing.


**THEY DID** everything as advertised and more. From standing starts they were scaming around the track at 60 miles per hour in seconds; they reached speeds of 70, 80 and 90 miles per hour on the straightaways, turned at the touch of a finger and demonstrated that everything their makers claimed for them, they could do. If such a thing is possible, with the great drivers like Fangio and Moss at the wheel, they out-performed their own advance billing.

After the four "races" to demonstrate the speed and handling qualities of the four cars, the drivers then put them over a rugged obstacle course which included a ploughed field, railroad ties, pot-holes and jumps.

**THE OBSTACLE** course demonstrated the super-suspension of the MG Sedan which would bounce into the air and make perfect four-point landings, no matter how fast it was traveling. The punishment meted out to the cars over this course left no doubt in the spectators' minds as to the strength and rugged quality of the BMC cars. They took a real beating and after it was all over, rode as smoothly as though they had just come off the assembly line.

One of the highlights of the day was the opportunity given to press and guests to ride with some of the great names in sport racing. Fangio, the legendary Grand Prix driver who won five consecutive world championships and retired undefeated in 1958, was literally mobbed by eager riders.
