

Motion picture footage of Torrance Civic Center, Delmo shopping center, Torrance beach, new industrial plants, attractive housing and King Harbor will be shown on the program which starts at 8 p.m. on KCOF (Channel 13).

Arranged by Cederlof, the program depicts the area as Los Angeles County's fastest growing region with residential, commercial, industrial and recreational facilities in well balanced proportion.

## Council Gets Request for Closing Laws

Torrance barbers served notice this week that they would renew efforts to get a Sunday closing law enacted when 80 of them petitioned the City Council for such an ordinance.

The petition sent to the City Council by B. P. (Penny) Pendleton and Herbert F. Jackson, both Waleria barbers, pointed out that several Los Angeles County cities had outlawed operation of barber shops on Sunday.

The local barbers based their request on the issue of "public health, public interest, and public safety," citing state regulations for barber shops which declare them to be a "business affecting the public health, public interest, and public safety."

This week's move marked the second time in recent years that a large number of Torrance barbers have sought the forced closing of the city's Sunday shops. Pendleton and Jackson reported that more than 90 per cent of the working barbers and shop owners in the city were behind the move. The Council denied the request previously.

The matter is scheduled for consideration when the City Council meets at 8 p.m. Tuesday.

## Service Clubs Open Rose Float Campaign

Local service clubs "kicked off" the annual Torrance Tournament of Roses Assn. fundraising program with presentation this week of money to help defray construction costs of this year's Torrance entry into the nationally-famous Pasadena Tournament of Roses parade.

## 30,000 Girl Scouts Hail Unit's 50th Anniversary

More than 30,000 Girl Scouts from 17 councils blanketing Los Angeles County, staged a tremendous salute to Girl Scouting at the giant Los Angeles Memorial Sports Arena Saturday, Nov. 17, as guests of the May Co.

They celebrated Girl Scouts 50th birthday which was dramatically climaxed in a closing ceremony involving hundreds of girls and the cutting of a huge birthday cake.

It was the biggest Girl Scout party ever held, with more than 15,000 Brownies assembled for a morning show and 15,000 Girl Scouts in the afternoon.

JOHN PREIS, manager of May Co. South Bay store, welcomed both assemblies, and a significant message was delivered by Mrs. Daniel Spivey, first vice chairman of Region 12, representing all Girl Scouts in Southern California.

The huge audience was entertained royally by television personalities, recording stars, exciting vaudeville acts, specially conceived Girl Scout acts and inspirational tableaux.

After an impressive opening ceremony featuring the 72nd United States Army Band, on hand to entertain the girls were Paul Petersen, from ABC-TV's "The Donna Reed Show"; Chad Everett, co-star of ABC-TV's "The Dakotas"; and popular Art Gillmore presided as master of ceremonies.
