With one Beverly Hills Invitational win under their belts, North and Torrance quintets will advance to the second round of the tournament today.

In Tuesday's first round of action, North stunned highly-favored Beverly Hills, 54-51, while Torrance was taking an easy 61-33 decision from weak Fillmore.

At 7:30 p.m. today, North will run into defending Pioneer League champion El Se-

gundo. The Eagles took a 53-39 win from Redondo in their opener.

Torrance will have it rougher. The Tartars will play either Compton or El Monte at 4:30 p.m. Compton is the defending CIF champion, but El Monte is favored to take the tourney crown.

Highly underrated North was led by the 15-point performance of Mike Gratzke and Al Lepper's 12-point effort.

The Saxons moved into a 14-11 lead at the end of the first quarter. Suddenly North got hot and began outscoring the Normans two-to-one and wound up with a 34-34 halftime lead.

Bouncing back with a vengeance, Beverly cut the gap to 42-37 as the third period drew to a close. The Normans assumed a one-point lead late in the game, but North soon moved back ahead to stay.

With seconds left to play, North cinched the game on a lay-up by Dennis Ireland, and finally a free throw by Steve Van Camp.

Alan Fay dropped in 18 points and Warren Tetley added 14 more to guide Beverly Hills.

Sticking to his strategy of never changing the tempo of a game, North coach Skip Enger refused to stall, even in the closing seconds. Enger

won five one-point games last year.

With Lynn Archibald pouring in 16 points, Steve Waters hitting for 15 markers, and Ernie Clayton connecting for 12 more, Torrance had an easy time with Fillmore.

The Tartars moved into a 38-21 halftime lead, and Torrance mentor Will Boerger used three sophomores during the final half in an attempt to keep the score down.

Marsden threw a five-hitter at Compton as the Bullets lengthened their first-place lead to two games.


