

NUCLEAR PLANT . . . A 90-acre site on the northwest corner of Camp Pendleton near San Clemente has been chosen by the Southern California Edison Co. for construction of an \$82 million nuclear powered plant to generate 395,000 kilowatts of electricity which could supply the

needs of a city of half a million population. The plant will be twice the size of any existing plants and will be financed largely from Southern California Edison Co. funds. Officials say the plant will be safer than many industrial plants.


He is past president of the Hermosa Beach Club and a Legion of Honor man, being a member of Kiwanis for 33 years.

'Flute and Arrow' Set At Recreation Center

"The Flute and the Arrow" will be shown at the Torrance Recreation Center, 3341 Torrance Blvd., 7:30 p.m., on Friday.

Starting this month, these films of the County Museum film series, presented in cooperation with the Torrance Recreation Department, will be

"The Flute and the Arrow" is the result of three years work by the film-maker, Eric Sucksdorff.

The film is about the Muria people who have lived in the Bastar jungle in the heart of India, and, though primitive, seem to have solved the problem of how human beings can live together peacefully and happily.

There are two things that follow a Muria man throughout his entire life: the bow and arrow, and the bamboo flute with ribbons of white cowrie shells.

They are two symbols of the search for food: one represents the tiger and the leopard who kill people and domestic animals; the other represents tenderness, love, children's games, and the growing rice field.

The film is narrated in English and lasts 78 minutes. There is no admission charge for these films.


'Together' Chooses Miss Hutchinson
