

## 75 Blood Transfusions And Still on the Job

Blood—75 pints transfused periodically during the last three years—keeps alive Mrs. Mary Portz, 3556 Garnet.

Despite the fact that she suffers an incurable disease, "Mitzi," as she is fondly called by her co-workers and friends, bravely and cheerfully carries out her assignments at Hawthorne Memorial Hospital where she is employed as a night supervisor.

"Mitzi," however, is forced to take off occasionally to do a stint in the hospital as a patient to receive blood transfusions. Last week she was admitted to Little Company of Mary Hospital as a patient for the fourth time since last September. Each time she receives at least four pints of blood.

FROM HER own experience as a registered nurse and as a blood recipient, Mitzi is grateful to Red Cross for acting as the collecting and distributing agent of blood.

When blood is needed it is

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needed NOW—the correct type and in adequate quantity. This is the service Red Cross can provide only with the cooperation of donors.

To assist Mitzi with her blood replacement responsibility, a delegation of Hawthorne Memorial staff members have signed up as donors for the Red Cross blood bank to be held in Hawthorne today.

OTHER individuals have made appointments to give blood in Mitzi's behalf, but still more blood credit will be needed.

To participate as a donor today in behalf of Mrs. Portz or to protect yourself, your family and friends who need blood, persons are asked to call Red Cross, OR 7-5858 or FR 2-5858.

The Hawthorne community blood bank will be held at the Knights of Columbus Hall, 331 N. Birch, Hawthorne from 2:30 to 7 p.m.

Mrs. John Black, blood chairman for the Hawthorne-Lawndale Red Cross branch, says 200 donors can be accomo-

dated during the collection period.

SHE REMINDS that "someone must give before anyone can receive. Because we give our blood — or belong to an organization that does—we protect ourselves, those around us and the entire Southland community. It's our program and needs our support."

Torrance residents will have an opportunity to be blood donors locally Feb. 23 when a Red Cross bloodmobile will set up collection facilities at the Elks Lodge, 1820 Abalone.

Mrs. Robert Orsini, local blood program chairman, says appointments can be made for this blood bank by calling her, FA 8-0647.
