



Lawmaker Asks: Is the Biggest Always the Best?

Whether the biggest is also the best is a good question. It certainly applies to the \$3.25 billion state budget for 1963-64 submitted to us by the Governor. It's the biggest in history—which is not news to anyone—but whether it is the best for California will be answered only after our legislative review and action.

During the months to come, the Senate Finance Committee and the Assembly Ways and Means Committee will meet in almost daily sessions to go over each budget request in detail, with the assistance of our legislative analyst and his staff, and the department of finance. To assist the committees, the analyst will prepare a comprehensive digest of the various items, and will submit his recommendations for our action on each.

In his accompanying message the Governor made a number of observations concerning the budget. He said that it adheres to the strictest standards of austerity, and that requests for hundreds of million dollars were turned down in its preparation.

THE MESSAGE stated that the budget is narrowly in balance. No new or higher taxes are proposed. However, a speed-up in the collection of income, ban, corporation, and insurance taxes is required to balance the budget. The message stated that it is necessary to put such taxes on a current basis, if the state is to avoid new taxes.

The method proposed for handling the change-over in collections calls for a two-year transitional period, 1963-64 and 1964-65. The personal income tax law would be amended to eliminate the privilege of paying the tax in installments as of Jan. 1, 1964, which means that all 1963 income taxes would be due April 15, 1964. Starting July 1, 1964, withholding of state income taxes would begin, and one-quarter of the 1964 tax due would be forgiven. Small taxpayers, those owing less than \$5 if sin-

gle, or \$10 if married, would be relieved of paying any tax. Principal shift in bank, corporation, and insurance taxes would be to require payment quarterly on a current basis.

Increased state revenues from all proposed tax changes are estimated at \$165.3 million in 1963-64 and \$151.1 million the next year.

THE VARIOUS major segments of the budget do not differ materially from those of preceding years, except as to size. The budget total is up some 12 per cent, as compared to a population rise of 3.5 per cent, and an increase of 5.7 per cent in total personal income.

Education, both grants to local districts and expenditures for higher education, accounts for almost 43 per cent of the total. Highway transportation costs will absorb almost 20 per cent, health and welfare 18, and natural resources, 6 per cent. Some new or additional programs in mental health, human rights, agriculture and tourism are proposed.

TAX EXPERTS say that per capita costs of government are most reliable indicators of the real burden on taxpayers. If this is so, it is interesting to note that the budget document gives the per capita expenditures of California state government as \$100.56 in 1949-50, and an estimated \$163.79 for 1963-64. Our increasing population is apparently demanding, and getting, more state government service.
