

Gold Award Added To Scholarship

Creation of a new "Edison Gold Award" to honor outstanding scholastic achievement by high school seniors has been announced by L. E. Jenkins, district manager for Southern California Edison Co.

The award—an attractive shield wall plaque—is being offered as a new feature of Edison's college scholarship program, he said.

Three of the foremost students in this region will be selected as winners of the Edison Gold Award by a local divisional selection board comprised of prominent educators and business and civic leaders. The board will convene on April 6, the electric company official said.
