Violations Cause Most Collisions

Driving safety can be defined in two simple terms — compliance and common sense, California Highway Patrol Commissioner Bradford M. Crittenden said.

"Our statistics show that more than four-fifths of all California accidents involve a violation of law. Compliance alone could eliminate a majority of the accidents.

"Common sense, or the lack of it, cannot be directly measured by statistics. But the mounting accident toll indirectly reflects a disregard of mature driving attitudes.

"Every time a motorist ag-

gressively takes the right of way in a conflict situation, lets his attention stray from the job of driving, tries to cover too much distance in too little time, or overdrives his visibility range—to name a few instances—he sets aside common sense for expediency.

Circulation Of Books at Record Level

Circulation of books by the Los Angeles County Public Library system continues to gain, with January 1963 circulation of 853,346 up 65,510 from the same month in 1962, a report by County Librarian John D. Henderson reveals.

Total circulation for the seven months completed in the current fiscal year was 5,105,199, a gain of 151,551 over the same period in 1962.

With circulation expected to hit its annual peak in the spring months of March, April, and May, Henderson pointed out that the indications are that the total circulation for fiscal year will pass nine and a half million by a comfortable margin, and that the following year will see more than 10 million books circulated.

LARGEST SINGLE category of circulation was in the field of adult non-fiction with a total of 237,170. All adult circulation reached 499,912. Children's books circulated during the month reached 353,434. Fines for overdue books in January, 1963, amounted to \$23,610.98, up \$1,857.84 over January, 1962.

Leading all of the 93 community branches in January, 1963, circulation was the West Covina Public Library, headquarters for the East San Gabriel Valley Region, with final figures of 35,907. Second was the Hawthorne Public Library, headquarters of the Centinela Region, where circulation was 32,262.

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
