Family Prayer Campaign To Be Stressed in Lent

"The Family that Prays Together... Stays Together." This is a slogan of depth and meaning. It has been seen and heard by nearly every person in North and South America, Europe, Asia, and Australia. It is a slogan that has slowly become as much a part of the American scene as any of the well-known advertising slogans and jingles, yet, strangely enough, it is non-commercial.

This small but startlingly important group of words has appeared in newspapers, television and radio programs, outdoor advertising posters, magazines and in public transportation placards.

MOST OF THOSE who are familiar with the slogan are totally unfamiliar with its origin. The slogan was conceived in 1947 by an Irish Roman Catholic priest from Notre Dame University, Father

Patrick Peyton of the Holy Cross Fathers. He had come to Hollywood to beg the movie stars to help him with his campaign to restore the solid practice of family prayer to the crumbling home life of America.

Stars of all faiths and beliefs rallied to his cause and the Mutual Broadcasting System gave him a half-hour to present a weekly dramatic radio program, non-sectarian in nature. For more than 16 years the program has continued without interruption.

SINCE 1947, Father Peyton's energy and determination has carried him to every nation in the world, excluding Russia. All that he preaches is contained in the words of his slogan. It is his unwavering conviction that the family who practices family prayer will possess a unity and happiness unavailable through any other source.

"Family prayer," said Father Peyton recently in New York, "can be likened to a precious stone lying beneath a shallow layer of earth. Unless an effort is made to unearth the stone, its value and beauty will go undiscovered. When a little effort is expended on family prayer, all the riches of the precious jewel become evident."

THROUGH THE cooperation of the Outdoor Advertising Assn. of America, outdoor advertising companies will place 4,000 billboards throughout the country. The estimated dollar value of the space will exceed \$150,000. The sign-board will feature Howard Scott's painting of a family at prayer with the world-famous slogan, "The Family That Prays Together... Stays Together."

This will be a reminder to people of all faiths to practice family prayer.

'Man' to Be Subject of Bible Topic

A Bible lesson on the subject "Man" will be read this Sunday at First Church of Christ, Scientist, Torrance.

Scriptural selections will include these verses from Psalms (90: 1, 16): "Lord, thou hast been our dwelling place in all generations... Let thy work appear unto thy servants, and thy glory unto their children."

Correlative readings will emphasize the Christian Science teaching that man's real identity is not material, but found in God as His spiritual image and likeness — what St. Paul referred to as "the new man" (Eph. 4:24).

At 6:30 p.m. a film on Taiwan, Base of Free China, will be shown.
