African Influence Sparks Travilla Collection For Las Vecinas Show

A fashion wind off the veldt and jungle, broozes through Travilla's 1963 spring and resort collection bringing with it fresh color and excitement, all due to this designer's recent safari in Africa. The spring showing of this collection will highlight the annual Spring Fashion Luncheon to be staged by Las Vecinas Club at the International Ballroom of the Beverly Hilton Hotel on March 20 at 12:30 p.m.

"However," says Travilla, "don't expect any show of zebra stripes or garish patterns. In the main, I have

tried to translate to this collection the purity of line and the surprising elegance found in the centuries-old methods of draping fabrics, used by the natives in the remote regions of the dark continent."

The designer's African-inspired "Samburnu drape" reaches its peak of interest in a bright terra cotta chiffon evening gown, one of the colors stemming from Travilla's African trek.

Another culture, resulting from the designer's swing around Greece, is reflected in a group of dresses using traditional pleats in new fashion. Mrs. Hugh Sutherland, show chairman, states that the mood of the collection is young with freedom and ease the keynote.
