

Great Books Institute Slated April 26 to 28

Dr. Donald Salk and James Pierson, leaders of the Torrance Great Books discussion group, recently announced to the group the opening of registration for the fifth annual Spring Institute to be held at Idyllwild, Calif., April 26 through 28. The institute is sponsored by the Los Angeles Great Books Council and is open to any participant or leader of a Great Books group. It will be held on the campus of the Idyllwild Arts Foundation and will consist of three discussion sessions and two social evenings. Participants will stay in the dormitories and eat their meals in the dining hall. This year single or double rooms are available for those preferring them to dormitory accommodations. The books to be discussed are: "Birth of Tragedy" by Nietzsche, Thomas Mann's "Mario The Magician," and "Mourning Becomes Electra" by Eugene O'Neill. Books will be mailed to those planning to attend as soon as their registration is received by the institute chairman. Earl Cleveland to Direct Retarded Children Center

The Garden Valley Assn. for Mentally Retarded Children has completed another major milestone towards their objective of offering a complete educational and training center for the retarded in the southwest area with the announcement that Earl Cleveland has joined the association's training center as executive director. Cleveland was graduated from UCLA in 1953, received his general secondary teaching credentials from Long Beach State College in 1954. His teaching experience includes industrial arts at East Downey Junior High School, art instructor at Long Beach City College, workshop instructor at Los Angeles County United Cerebral Palsy Assn., and executive director of the training center for the handicapped of San Joaquin County. Cleveland received the "President's Committee for Employment of the Handicapped Citation for Meritorious Service." This award was given to him for his untiring efforts and leadership in developing an outstanding program for all the handicapped children in San Joaquin County. In September 1960, the Garden Valley ARC opened a training center with one teacher. The purpose in opening the training center was to offer a professionally organized training program for all mentally retarded, who were not eligible for a public school program, in the Southwest area. Today the training center is staffed by an executive director, two teachers, one assistant teacher and one volunteer teacher's aid. Bus transportation is available for those who could not otherwise attend the training center. Current enrollment includes mentally retarded from ages 4 to 23 from the following areas: Gardena, Hawthorne, Inglewood, Lawndale, Lennox, Los Angeles, Manhattan Beach, Redondo Beach, Rolling Hills Estates and Torrance. Medical Self Help Set for March 20

The Torrance Civil Defense Commission, with the cooperation of Torrance Memorial Hospital will conduct a series of Medical Self Help classes, each a two-hour session, beginning March 20, at 7:30 p.m. A nationwide program, Medical Self Help, will cover hygiene, water and food, shock, bleeding and bandaging, artificial respiration, fractures and splinting, burns, nursing care, infant and child care, and emergency childbirth. Doctors, nurses, and fire department members will be among the qualified instructors. Medical Self Help instruction is designed to train laymen in proper medical procedure following the application of first aid when doctors and hospitals are not available, such as following a natural or war-caused disaster.
