

## Dr. Stuart Marsee Elected to Board

Dr. Stuart E. Marsee, president of El Camino College, will serve a three-year term as a member of the board of directors of the American Assn. of Junior Colleges, following his election to that office in Seattle, Wash.

The association has a membership representative of over 500 junior colleges and serves as a clearing house for the promotion of professional and educational excellence in junior college education.

Activities of the board centers on the aims of the association to assist and stimulate efforts to raise the level of administrative competence, develop comprehensive curricula and to clarify public understanding of the functions of junior colleges.

Dr. Marsee, now serving his fifth year at El Camino, is a recognized authority on school business management and economic trends which have influenced education in America.

Prior to his appointment to the El Camino presidency, Dr. Marsee served as acting superintendent and assistant superintendent for business services of the Pasadena City Schools.

He is a graduate of the University of Oregon, earning both his B.S. and M.S. degrees in

the major field of school administration and the minor field of business administration.

The degree of doctor of education was granted President Marsee by the University of Southern California in June, 1947.

## Local Plants Send Foreign Aid Material

Shell Chemical Co.'s Torrance plant and the Dow Chemical Co. of Torrance have supplied industrial products valued at \$79,919 to overseas buyers in recent contracts financed under the U. S. foreign aid program, the Agency for International Development reported recently.

The Shell plant received orders for \$69,308 worth of synthetic rubber going to buyers in the United Arab Republic of Turkey. The Dow plant furnished a firm in Seoul, Korea, with \$10,005 worth of chemicals.

## Victor Park Development Budget Asked

A \$35,000 budget for the first phase of development of Victor Park has been submitted to the Parks and Recreation Commission.

The report was submitted by Harry B. Van Bellehem, recreation department director. The proposed budget, Bellehem said, has been approved by the Victor Woman's Club and other responsible groups and individuals in the area.

He called for submission of the budget to the City Council as soon as possible so that work may proceed immediately.

Allotted in the budget is \$12,000 for grading and fill, \$1,125 for curbs, gutters and sidewalks, \$2,595 for driveways and parking, security lighting \$550; lawns and sprinklers, \$15,600; \$1,925 for planting trees and shrubs, and \$1,000 for fencing.
