Homemakers Service is the only new social service agency to be established in the Los Angeles area in over 30 years. It supplements but does not duplicate the services of any public or private agency. The service was started approximately four years ago after a three-year study by the Welfare Planning Council.

The South Bay area has had limited Homemaker Service since September, 1962, primarily because of large donations by the Sandpipers and Kappa Alpha Theta. More funds are needed to keep this service in the South Bay Area.
