

Cabrillo Savings' Expansion Project Begun at Ceremonies

Local civic and business leaders took part in ceremonies Tuesday afternoon at a "concrete-breaking" ceremony that marked the beginning of Cabrillo Savings expansion to new quarters.

A \$200,000 construction job on the southwest corner of the Crenshaw-Pacific Coast Highway intersection will give the growing association an impressive new home in keeping with its position as a leading financial institution in the local community.

Designed by the architectural firm of Powers, Daly & DeRosa, the building will give the busy corner a completely new look with a 30-foot high colonnade formed by a series of concrete, elongated arches to give a dramatic effect of classic elegance.

The complete construction is scheduled to be finished late this fall, and will provide 8,600 square feet on the ground floor for operations of Cabrillo Savings, plus an additional 2,700 square feet on the mezzanine to be utilized later as required by continued growth.

Pietro DiCarlo, president and board chairman of Cabrillo Savings, presided at the opening ceremonies. Millie & Severson is the general contractor.

SPOKESMEN for developer Don Wilson continue to insist that homes in the tract are being offered on a nondiscriminatory basis, but that no Negroes have attempted to purchase a home except attorney Odus B. Jackson. His \$500 deposit check was returned by the bank because he had insufficient funds to cover it. Wilson's organization reported.

Disputes between Wilson and CORE on another Southland tract which had gone to court was apparently settled this week when the integrationists announced they were dropping the suit after a home sold to a Negro couple had gone into escrow.
