questions were their prerogative, but he assured the group that the questions would be handled by a non-partisan committee. Pearson also said all questions were answered at the earlier meeting unless they duplicated others.

Asked if he would be in favor of permitting a speaker for the opposition on the panel, Brigham said, "I would not. I would be in favor of the Birch Society holding its own meet-

ing." He also said it was not the intention of the sponsoring group to turn the discussion into a debate.

RATHER, BRIGHAM repeated, "We hope to shed some light on the legal, social, and moral implications of the civil rights movement, and to interpret some of the new laws dealing with his problem."

The forum will begin at 7 p.m. at the Torrance High Auditorium. A collection will be taken in which adults are asked to contribute \$1.
