

Constitutionality of New Housing Bill Questioned

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GET ACTION IN A CLASSIFIED AD

 Governor Edmund G. Brown
 issued his Press Release No. 672, Sept. 11, calling on all Californians to commemorate the 176th anniversary of the signing of the U. S. Constitution by rededicating themselves to "the American aspiration toward a truly free and equal society for all citizens."
 The Governor's press release upholding the U.S. Constitution is certainly praiseworthy but it

arrived in the same mail with hundreds of letters from both Democrats and Republicans who are greatly disturbed about the Governor's press release No. 639, dated Aug. 2, and his printed folder dated July 24, both of which relate to "Fair Employment Practices." The statutory basis for the Governor's executive orders, folders, and press releases on fair employment practices are all found in California State laws authorized by

three members of the Assembly. The first group of laws were authored and carried through the legislature to the Governor's desk by Augustus F. Hawkins, then a member of the Assembly and now a member of Congress. After the Hawkins bills relating to the establishment of the Fair Employment Practice Commission and related subjects became laws, Jesse M. Unruh, Speaker

of the Assembly, pushed through a bill in which it was spelled out that it should be referred to as "The Unruh Act."
 It became a law and added to the restrictions on the rights of citizens in dealing with so-called "minority groups," but actually intended to give Negroes an advantage over other so-called minority groups.
 The third law, enacted during the recent 1963 regular session, was authored by Assem-

blyman William Byron Rumford and extends and puts more teeth in the legislative field of "Fair Practice" relating to the sale or lease of real estate by the owners, brokers, agents, etc. The constitutionality of the Rumford law is doubtful, in spite of what Attorney General Stanley Mosk may say, and unless it is taken off the statute books by referendum, it will be tested in the courts all the way from a Superior Court, through the District Court of Appeals, to the State Supreme Court and if necessary to the U.S. Supreme Court.

hesitate to speak publicly on this subject because they fear the violent attacks of communist-directed organizations.
RACIALLY, Jesse M. Unruh, Democratic Speaker of the Assembly, and member of the Assembly from the 65th District, is a white man. After the last re-apportionment, he moved into a fine home in the 46th Assembly District.
 There is no person in the United States who wants equal rights for all U. S. citizens more than I do, but I want equal rights for all citizens, including white people, American Indians, people of Chinese ancestry, people of Japanese ancestry, people of Korean ancestry, and people of Latin-American ancestry. Incidentally, people of Mexican ancestry are legally recognized in the California Statutes and court decisions as Caucasians.
 In actual practice, the law authored by Hawkins, Unruh, and Rumford are giving Negroes rights superior to all other citizens of the United States. This violates the U. S. Constitution, which Governor Brown wants us to reverse this month, and it also violates the Constitution of the State of California.
