### Law In Action

America whose law is much like English law has carried forward its tradition of justice and fair play. Our Constitution for example, says that "in all criminal prosecutions the accused shall enjoy the right to have the assistance of counsel for his defense."

But how do you obtain counsel if you have no money? In at least 25 states, including, of course, California, you have the right to request that the court name a lawyer for you if you cannot afford one. In big cities a public defender will help. Elsewhere the judge may name a defense lawyer whom the county pays for his services. The U. S. Supreme Court just recently insisted that the accused in federal court also had a right to counsel.

YOU MAY have asked: "How can a lawyer defend a man whom he knows is guilty?" First of all, nobody can "know" except the accused. But the real answer lies in our sense of fair play—and our grasp of the fact that things are not always what they may seem to be.

On this point a lawyer will tell you: "It is fundamental that no man is guilty of a crime until a court convicts him. As an accused man's lawyer, I have no right to prejudice him, no matter what he may choose to say. It may be that he has, in fact, done all he is accused of. I may abhor his acts and despise him in person. Yet as a sworn officer of the court it is my duty to present his case with all my skill, and to find, if I can, some circumstance, some flaw in the trial procedure, some fact, which can help him."

### Artist Opens First Show Here Friday

Jurgis Sapkus, a versatile Lithuanian artist now making his home in Manhattan Beach, will open his first one-man show in the Southwest area Friday at the Cooperative Gallery.

Sapkus, whose work has been exhibited in New York, Canada, Chicago, and Boston, as well as the continent, will exhibit some of his watercolors, oils, and a special "Madonna of the Desert," a scale-model figure designed for the St. Mary Desert Hospital in Apple Valley.

The gallery will be open from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. Tuesday through Sunday. A reception will be held on opening night.

But a LAWYER'S duty is even heavier when his client is found guilty. For it is then a man or woman needs a friend in court to tell his story. In this man's case his lawyer is, again duty bound to search out all mitigating circumstances. Otherwise our system of punishment could go awry. For a guilty man may legally get probation, a suspended sentence, a fine, a jail term, a prison term, and even death. It is the district attorney's duty to urge the views of the prosecution.

It is the defense attorney's job to urge leniency.

IT THEN becomes the judge's duty, in most cases, to decide between them. In the case of the death sentence, the jury must decide. But in any event, under our "adversary" theory of a trial, both prosecution and defense are expected to work hard for their results.
