

Lawndale Ends Montgomery's Win Spree

North Earns Civil War Victory

Miscues Hamper Knights

Bulldog tough Lawndale knocked high-flying Bishop Montgomery down to ground level with a 25-6 non-league football triumph over the previously unbeaten Knights on Friday.

Over confident following two straight triumphs, Montgomery was hobbled by its own crucial miscues and a Lawndale line that "came to play ball," according to BMHS mentor George Swade.

Montgomery managed to halt the Cardinals' highly-touted ground attack but two long bombs put the host eleven ahead at halftime by a 13-0 count.

CARLOS THOMPSON put the Knights back in the game on the third quarter kickoff as he galloped 75 yards for the touchdown.

After the ensuing kickoff, Lawndale was immediately held on downs and forced to punt. With Montgomery threatening to move into a tie, Thompson fumbled the ball and the Knights collapsed.

"THEIR LINE was terrific. They really kept the pressure on us," Coach Swade commented.

Line play was not the only obstacle Lawndale put up. Mike Leitzell and Mike Fiddler were instrumental in the Cardinal win. Leitzell tallied twice while Fiddler came through with one touchdown and a conversion.

FOLLOWING a scoreless first quarter, the Cardinals shoved over two counters in the second period and tallied one in each of the last two stanzas.

Two upset wins, the most consecutive victories in Montgomery's grid history, was too much success for the Knights to take. One more triumph and BMHS will record its most successful season ever.


By halftime, the Tribe margin was only 7-6 as Pierce bounced back with a second-quarter score.

JOHN RANCE RUNS WILD

Slippery John Rance uncorked three spectacular touchdown gallops around right end with 1:14 left in the opening stanza. Bill Cunerty converted to give North a 13-0 lead.

The Saxons boomed 55 yards in four plays for the second tally.

Quarterback Sam Elliott and Kent Hiner combined for a five-yard scoring toss minutes into the second quarter to give North a 19-0 lead.

A mental mistake on the kickoff cost South the touchdown. Spartan players failed to fall on the loss pigskin and North had a first down on the South 15.

North was unable to score against until the final minute of the third quarter when Elliott boomed one yard on a keeper play and Cunerty converted.

Six plays covered 24 yards for North after South was forced to punt from its own six yard line. Dave Rance ran the punt back 12 yards to the South 24.

It was all John Rance in the final period. On the second play of the fourth quarter, he

picked off a Scott Christensen pass and went 30 yards for the score to give North a 32-0 lead.

Then, in the most spectacular individual effort of the evening, Elliott threw short to Hiner, who lateralled to John Rance and the scabback zig-zagged, spun and cut his way 64 yards for the final score. Cunerty again converted.

North wound up with 377 total yards, picking up 22 on the ground and 155 through the air. South's ground attack provided 67 net yards while the air offense netted 37 yards.

Carson Nips Lennox For First Grid Win

Two football oddities Friday night allowed fledgling Carson High to defeat Lennox, 17-13, for its first pigskin victory in history.

A pair of second-half safeties provided the winning margin for the single-wing Colts following an ineffectual first half. Carson's first two-pointer occurred when Lennox attempted to quick kick and the snap from center was high and rolled into the end zone.

Another safety popped up in the final stanza when the Lancer quarterback was trapped in his own end zone as he attempted to pass.

In between, Carson tallied

on a 12-yard jaunt by Quentin James in the third quarter and a one-foot plunge by fullback Rich McMahon in the final stanza.

Surprising Lennox moved into a 6-0 lead with a second-quarter touchdown and then tallied again in the fourth quarter to move ahead 13-8 before the Colts began moving.

CARSON'S winning drive began with four minutes showing on the clock as McMahon and tailback Mike Turner picked up most of the yardage.

Following the Colt counter, Lennox proceeded to march down to the Carson 12-yard

stripe before losing 25 yards on the final play of the game.

HEAD CARSON coach Gene Vollnogle praised the efforts of 205-pound blocking back Bob Nold. Nold was responsible for the big holes in the Lancer line that McMahon and Turner found available throughout the night.

Guards Ed Sutherland and Ed Duthorn also drew praise from Vollnogle.

IN ITS OPENING game on Monday, Carson was sent down to a 16-6 defeat against West High in a game Vollnogle felt his club could have won.

Carson's next opposition will be provided on Friday by Lincoln High as the Colts move into competition against City elevens.

South will engage Long Beach Wilson on Tuesday in an away meet before opening the Bay League season on Friday against Santa Monica.


Hollypark Pace Caps Big Week
