### Council Adopts New School Drop-Out Plan

Top Southern California industrial and educational leaders have unveiled a new plan to recognize and encourage vocational arts students to stay in school, members of the Southern California Industry-Education Council have announced.

The new approach is expected to reduce the number of dropouts in the area, according to Admiral C. F. Horne, president of the General Dynamics Co.

Admiral Horne told representatives of the news media this week, "The Council has adopted a new program designed to give greater support and attention to the less talented student. Those students of medium ability or below, many of whom are potential dropouts, deserve the encourage-

ment of the entire business and industrial community."

HE EMPHASIZED that the Industry-Education Council would not diminish its work with top scholastic students and the annual science fairs in Los Angeles County would continue.

"Our objective in this expanded approach is to devise ways to increase and improve support through work experience programs in vocational and technical fields," Horne said.

He was joined at the press conference by Fred L. Hartley, senior vice president of Union Oil Co.; Paul E. Sullivan, vice president of Bank of America; Dr. Gilbert L. Brown, assistant to the president, University of Redlands; and, Dr. T. Stanley Warburton, associate superintendent, Los Angeles city schools.

The program will be officially inaugurated on Nov. 5 at a banquet to be held at the Biltmore Hotel, Biltmore Bowl, featuring Charles H. Percy, chairman of the board of Bell & Howell Co. The banquet will pay a special tribute to education, recognizing the priceless contribution of education to the economic development and community betterment of Southern California.

Four activities are already set up by the Council and will be underway shortly, Horne said. These are:

A SPECIAL Medalist Award initiated for the under-motivated student to inspire and inform the youth in our schools regarding the opportunities, needs, and qualifications of scientific and technological manpower.

On Feb. 25, the National Assn. of Accountants in conjunction with the Southern California Business Show, will acquaint all high school and junior college students in Los Angeles County through a special workshop on the latest innovations in the field of management services.

A special managerial team, organized by the California Society of Certified Public Accountants, to bring to the teachers, counselors, administrators and students clear factual data on the breadth of financial management communications, the many roles of the accountant, and the operation of a business.

A vocational guidance interview program to provide opportunity for students to have a personal interview with an individual working in the occupation the student expects to enter. This would be on a person to person basis. In addition, the Council will support and work more actively with programs of adult education to recover drop-outs and provide retraining.
