Harbor Jolts Circuit Foes

History-making Harbor College will go into tomorrow afternoon's pigskin contest with Los Angeles City College as the top team in the Western State Conference.

A huge Homecoming crowd watched the Seahawks do everything right as they rang up their fourth straight triumph and tallied their largest number of points in history. In the past three games, Harbor has recorded 81 points while blanking its opponents.

MATTERS GOT underway in a hurry against Pasadena as Harbor recovered a Lancer fumble on the opening kickoff and marched for six points in seven plays. Charlie Shaw took a pitchout from All-American quarterback candidate Ray Jones and tallied from six yards out.

Jones kept his hand in the pot on the next TD, throwing

35 yards to Stuart Horn who ran another 30 yards to paydirt. The third Seahawk touchdown came on another six-yard gallop by Shaw.

BEFORE intermission, John Cvitanich pulled in a 37-yard bomb from Jones to give Harbor a 26-0 margin.

In the second half, Cvitanich came back to tally on a 10-yard flip from Jones and again on a one-yard toss from the Seahawk chucker. Cvitanich's final touchdown was set up by a 69-yard throw from Jones to Horn.

THE FINAL Harbor score

came when Nolan Bowie crossed over from the eight. Jones ran for one conversion, passed to Steve Cox for another and Norm Calligagan kicked the third.

Los Angeles City has been the most inconsistent eleven in the conference. In the circuit opener, the Cubs dropped a 6-0 duke to perennially weak Ventura and then came back to tie defending champ Glendale, 6-6. Los Angeles out-downed Glendale, 10-2, and outgained it in total offense, 177-71.

LAST WEEK, the Cubs suffered a 27-14 defeat from

Compton. In pre-conference action, San Pedro edged Los Angeles, 15-14, and earned a 27-7 duke over Harbor.

Halfback Don McCall, touted as an All-American prospect, and quarterbacks Spencer Washington and Ray Arrington top the Cub offensive attack.

COACH SCRAPPY Rhea, in his first year at Harbor, will have plenty of material with which to counter. Jones was on target all night with his passes against Pasadena and was outstanding on defense, Rhea noted.

Cvitanich, who had played so little his number was not even listed on the program, grabbed three touchdown tosses.

RHEA COMPLIMENTED the play of linemen Mike Ferragamo, John Bjazevich, Jerry Rodich and Bob Lowery. Nolan Bowie, a regular halfback on the 1961 Seahawk squad, also drew praise from Rhea.

In one of the game's high points, 280-pound tackle Walter Crump intercepted a Pasadena pass in the waning moments of the first half. Harbor immediately turned the ball into six points.

Narbonne to Battle Banning

Narbonne High will place its highly-valued one-game football winning string on the line tomorrow in a Marine League battle at Banning.

Currently leading the league with Jordan, Banning will host the 8 p.m. fray.

Twenty-four games of frustration ended for Narbonne last week with a 7-0 triumph over San Pedro. Three winless years had elapsed before the Gauchos snapped the draught with a fourth quarter tally.

VIC ZAGALA blocked a Pedro punt to set up the score, but it took some doing to push the pigskin across. Albert Thompson was held for no gain and quarterback Steve Stanley lost 14 yards attempt-

ing to pass before huge Lloyd Edwards picked up 10.

Facing a fourth and 14 situation on the Pirate 29, Stanley cut around his right end, reaching the 20-yard line before fumbling. Thailing the play, Bruce Goforth picked up the ball and went the remainder of the distance.

EDWARDS bulled over for the conversion and Narbonne had won with 10:18 still remaining in the game.

Everything the Gauchos attempted came out perfectly, largely because of the Narbonne line.

"NO TEAM has handled San Pedro the way we did," Gauchos boss Elmer Douglas commented. "It was hard to tell if it was really our team on the field, the boys looked to much

different from the first four games," he added.

Proud of his club's stunning upset, Douglas had nothing but praise of the Gauchos. The difference in past performances, according to Douglas, was the fact that Narbonne finally played 48 minutes of football.

IN THE PAST, Douglas had complained the Gauchos were only playing one or two periods of good football. Twice his belief was vividly demonstrated.

Narbonne trailed Huntington Park, 20-0, going into the

fourth quarter in a pre-season game, and then suddenly exploded for two touchdowns in five minutes as Thompson and then Edwards broke loose for long six point jaunts.

AGAINST JORDAN, Narbonne pulled the same trick, waiting until the last stanza, when it was trailing 36-0, before breaking loose. Then the Gauchos rammed over a pair of quick tallies. Bob Brooks cut around left end for long yardage and a TD and a sustained drive resulted in another.

came from senior Larry Parker, who earned a 29th in the varsity division.


