Lloyd A. Reist, personnel consultant for the Torrance Unified School District, has received his doctoral degree in Education from the University of Southern California.



Dr. Reist, a native of Kansas, received his bachelor's degree at Kansas University, and earned his master's degree at the University of Southern California. He is a veteran of World War II, during which he served in the Navy. He began his career in Torrance as an instrumental music teacher. In 1956 he was named vice principal of Seaside Elementary School. He became a personnel consultant for the district in 1957. Dr. Reist is married and has one son, Paul, who is 11 years of age. His wife is an interior decorator. The family makes its home in Torrance.
